Once you pass the "Don't leave your car unattended!" warning notices, the pub offers a warm welcome. We only arrived in the evening and though most of the folk revellers seemed to have drifted either home or to the Ceilidh upstairs, we spent an enjoyable evening in the downstairs room **singing around** with assorted Folk Club luminaries including Mike Domady from Leigh and Jon Fitzgerald all the way from "Dawhn Souff" (Plymouth or Portsmouth, I think...remember we were drinking round the calender!)

Jon, whose advert appears in this magazine, is a fine singer and poet, with a rich lived in voice (maybe even squatted-in from time to time) and provided and incredibly varied and interesting repertoire. He is very reasonable and his fees would make an entertaining addition to any local club guest list. Give him a ring on 0705 876969. Maybe we should design a Folk North West calender on the lines of those peanut board advertisements; every packet you buy uncovers another tantalising and non-sexist glimpse of.... yes, you've guessed it, Charles Fyson's beard!!

GUESS WHAT THEY'RE SELLING AT THE HAPPINESS COUNTER?

Is the title of Leon Rosselson's compilation CD on Fuse Records (CFCD 003) which is on my turntable at this very minute (a pity really it would sound much better on a CD player) bringing back many happy memories of a gig I once played with Leon in Bolton. "Q" Magazine wrote ".... a genuinely challenging songwriter whose work radiates acumen and wit!" I have a suspicion however that they were talking about Leon and not about me.

The CD contains no less than 19 Rosselson classics culled from many LP's and is a must for both budding lyricists and those with a memory long enough to stretch back to Leon's days with Robin Hall, Jimmy McGregor and Shirley Bland in **The Galliards**; an excellent group from the early days of the revival.

Rosselson's songs have been covered by many singers and have gained him a well deserved world wide reputation, mine on the other hand, have been covered by piles of dust and world wide indifference. C'est la Vie!

Leon's songs are beautifully crafted and deserve a wider audience. (His song **Abiezer Coppe!** would make an ideal choice for The Shamen's next single! or did they do it as their last one?).

ALAN BOND (BONDY)

The world of folk, from Devon to Darwen. Sidmouth to Sabden, was rendered poorer by the death on 11 October of Alan Bond, singer, story teller, poet and bones-player.

52 years old Alan was an Accrington lad, proud of the fact and of his Accrington accent. He was universally liked at Folk Festivals throughout the country, and a fine ambassador for Lancashire.

Alan worked all his life as a printer, and owned his own works in Blackburn. A few years ago, he printed a book of monologues and what he called "Perfectly true Stories" (which were really enormous lies) - all of which he had written himself. "Saturday Night at the Duck and Trumpet" was a great success, and brought people to Oswaldtwistle to seek out this pub. which he had dreamed up. Mostly the tales in it were of the humorous type, but Alan could write fine, moving poetry too. His poem about the Accrington pals of the First World War - "No Time Fer Skrikin" can move to tears., even after he might have had his audience splitting their breeches with his monologue about Dugdale, the man who saved England from Hitler, or another about men who wear toupees.

Only a few months before his untimely death, Alan had moved to Devon in preparation for marrying Karen, whom he met at Sidmouth Festival. The church was packed out with folk-loving friends. They held a celebration for his life, even recalling his days as a Garstang Morrisman.

A couple of weeks after his passing, Nick & Mally Dow hosted a special edition of Radio Lancashire's Lancashire Drift, Alan's brother Les chatted with Alan Bell, Bob Dobson, Derek Stanton and Jim Atherton, using some of Alan's tapes to break up the conversation and laughter. All present agreed it had been a bloody good night. They knew that Bondy was present though absent. Plans are afoot for the creation of an Alan Bond Cup at the next Fylde Folk Festival. He won't be taking part in three sessions of the Festival he ran last year - The Official Snuff Workshop, the Poems and Pints Session and The Doom & Gloom Session. Life-long mate Bob Dobson describes him as "The Premier Bond".

I shake me yed and wonder Just what it's aw abeawt That a roarin greyt fire of talent Lahk a tuppeny candle's snuffed eawt.





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












TO THE EDITOR

1993 has arrived and brought with it more bad news for folk music. On January 1st ORACLE lost its licence to provide information on ITV and S4C/ Channel 4 to TELETEXT LTD. Unfortunately this has meant the loss of further folk music services.

Many of your readers will be aware that ORACLE provided a folk and jazz gig guide on HTV and Granada updated daily on page 232. Fewer readers may also be aware that on S4C an even more important twenty page Welsh Music scene information service gave details of concerts, news and record reviews for the Welsh language music scene (with much emphasis placed on the exceedingly lively folk set). Unfortunately both services have been dropped by TELETEXT. A general English language gig guide (aimed at the pop market) still exists but this can be no substitute for that formerly enjoyed on ITV ORACLE.

It is a shame that specialist music (and the Welsh language) has again been overlooked by the media. Tiring as it may be I ask you all to write to Teletext Ltd, PO Box 297, London, SW6 1XT to call for the reinstatement of these popular services.

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BOOKSHELF

PICKING SOOTY BLACKBERRIES -THE SONGS OF KEITH MARSDEN 1939 - 1991

As the title suggests this book certainly does contain the songs of the late Keith Marsden - but how much more it evokes scenes and memories of all kinds, prompted by his succinct portrayal of people, places and events.

Malcolm Storey whom most of us know as the tireless force behind Whitby Festival, has written the Foreword giving us a glimpse of the man behind the songs. This is followed by a concise biography with some rare photographs, culminating of course in the sad demise of Keith. However there is nothing maudlin or gloomy about it.

The songs themselves are well presented with music transcribed by Susan Jennings from tapes provided by Cockersdale. Every song has its own collection of background stories and anecdotes skilfully crafted by John O'Hagan and Graham Put with a little help from their friends, and of course Val Marsden. I'm not going to list the songs - that is for you to discover for yourselves when you purchase the book. All I will say is that the joker in the pack packs a "Trunch".

This book is not an obituary but rather a celebration of the relatively short life of a man with a unique talent and perception touched with humour, with a final word - not unexpectedly - from the Wilsons.

Practicalities - a book well put together, excellently printed on a good quality paper, easy on the eye, and a hard back binding. Published by Fellsongs Music Publishing, Workington, Cumbria.

SONGsmith TWO - SONGsmith - CASSETTE AND BOOKLET

Having already discussed the merits of the idea of the series of SONGsmiths in my review of SONGsmith ONE, I will concern myself only with the material in this one.

As was the case with SONGsmith ONE there is a mixture of "famous" and not so famous song writers. In general terms I think the songs on side two are the strongest, both musically and lyrically. More specifically, **the** song of the cassette for me is Martin Hall's

I Never Knew. When I first played it I thought for a moment I was listening to Keith Marsden (!) which gives some idea of the quality of Martin's own writing and singing skills. Also notable is Mal Brown's Stand Up which is very well constructed, and likewise it is good to see my old friend Andy Barnes featured with his critique of the newspaper media called Reading Between the Lines.

Kevin Mitchell, of Stramash leads a beautiful performance of the late Mat McGinn's **Troubled Waters**.

Bill Caddick, Leon Rosselson, Peggy Seeger & Irene Scott show their individual writing and performing talents with their left wing orientated renditions. In fact much of the cassette has a socialist slant to it - well, there is a surprise - folk songs with a left wing bias and selected by Pete Coe!

Less well-known artists include Midlander Colin Pitts with his tribute to the Titanic called **Let Her Lie**, Anna Ryder showing off her excellent guitar accompaniment to **The Session Song** and Ray Bradfield singing **Building Another England**.

As before, the cassette is accompanied by a comprehensive book of words and, this time, chords and information on the artists accompaniments to the songs. There is also an interesting article by Pete on the PRS. All in all it is excellent value at plus 70p p&p, mail order from SONGsmith, 103 Oldham Road, Ripponden, West Yorkshire, HX6 4EB.

Keep up the good work, Mr Coe, and all you performers out there get singing!

FOLK ROOTS - A National Institution?

When "Southern Rag" started up in 1979, its first issue defined its catchment area as "Surrey, Middlesex, Berkshire, North Hampshire and Sussex and Around" and it featured a piccy of Pete Coe on the cover! In the intervening years "and Around" has expanded to include most of the known world - but the magazine, now "Folk Roots" still feature Pete Coe!

My readership of FR started in 1986, as I discovered when looking back through the issue to put this review together. In 1986 FR's readership survey showed that the "average" reader - is there such a

thing? - was 31 and 37% read The Guardian! I'm a well known Guardian reader, but in 1986 I was definitely under-age for Folk Roots.

In going back through the archives it soon became apparent that one short review could not do justice to the contents of FR in the past 6 years, let alone its lifetime, so I have restricted myself to features from 1992.

So what happened in 1992? The cover stories were as varied as Buffy Sainte-Marie, the Kathryn Tickell Band, Pops Staples, Fairport Convention and Emmylou Harris - as varied as I have come to expect from FR. But what of the content? The most frequent criticism I have heard levelled at Folk Roots is the lack of coverage of British Folk - so what is the real situation?

There were major features on Ireland's superb Mary Black, and the fiddler Tommy Peoples, interviews with double bass player and long-time folk-jazz performer Danny Thompson and, sticking with the veterans, a feature in Ralph McTell's 25 years in the business. Also a wonderful interview with Beryl Marriott - the woman who encouraged Swarb to persevere with his fiddle lessons, and has done so much to update traditional dance music, plus an account of Jungr & Parker's sudanese tour, The Oyster Band, the wonderful quartet Sisters Unlimited whose eclectic material includes the best of british tradition and contemporary material, Rosie Cross on the storytelling revival, features on all the cover artists and much much more....

Regular features always include Root Salad (Short articles on performers and current Folk issues), club news and tour dates, reviews, and letters - the letter writers are often as well known as the performers features in the magazine's other pages - oh yes, and articles on traditional music from other countries.

BRITISH HIT ALBUMS / BRITISH HIT SINGLES

Published by Guinness Music Publishing

The Book of British Hit Albums is a companion to the Book of British Hit Singles and has been compiled by the same team of Paul Gambaccini and Tim Rice with input from Jonathan Rice.

Whilst everyone remembers their favourite no 1 record, and artists are remembered for that one particular record that catapults them to stardom, it is interesting to note that far more albums are bought by the record buying public today than singles. This feat alone ensures a great deal of interest and thus large sales of this publication.

A number of fascinating facts come to light when exploring the longest selling album. Artists can be hugely successful without having a string of hit singles to their name.

As an example **Led Zeppelin** have had eight chart topping albums from ten releases spanning over thirteen years, yet have never had a hit single. The album **Bat Out of Hell** by **Meat Loaf** was in the charts for a staggering 416 weeks yet he has had only one top ten single release - **Dead Ringer for Love** which was not on the Bat Out of Hell album.

The books particular title British Hit Albums illustrates that our tastes are not always that of our neighbours over the pond and I was amazed to learn that our four most popular albums of 1991 did not enter the Billboard Top 100 chart whilst of the American quartet of Mariah Carey, Garth Brookes, Black Crows and C & C Music Factory only Mariah Carey was moderately successful.

I think this is a healthy trend as it proves that there are diverse tastes in music and no matter how record companies try to dictate our musical trends, the public will buy what the public wants to buy which is not always the case with singles where "hype" and constant advertising can ensure an artist or artists can have some fame and possible fortune albeit somewhat short lived.

The trend over the last couple of years has been to play safe and buy hit compilations or Greatest Hit collections by a favourite artist, which although ensuring satisfaction to the listener is a little worrying as new artists need to be heard and their records bought to inject freshness into the musical scene and to ensure stagnation does not prevail.

On a musically healthy note, it is worth knowing that classical music has substantially increased its sales in Britain over the last couple of years, with artists like Pavarotti and Nigel Kennedy becoming household names rather than being known only to the connoisseur. This phenomenon is a quirk of the British record buying public as classical musical sales in the rest of Europe are shrinking rapidly.

If I were to sum up the difference between the albums volume and its singles counterpart, I would say it illustrates an artists enduring talent which can span many years and shows evolution of a particular style which can grow and blossom giving great pleasure along the way.

Record aficionados will find this a thoroughly enjoyable read, while statisticians will drool when able to prove a point over an artists longevity or otherwise. All in all a must for fans of popular music.

The snack bar, the black pudding stall, and entrance to the Tower all seemed to do very well. LOCAL CRAFTS

Moon's Mill Craft Museum and Gallery at Higher Walton, near Preston, is Dorothy Horsfall's dream come true. Corn dolly making has long been her interest; for years she has done the rounds of church groups and craft fairs. Now she has a permanent stage from which to work and show her skill.

Corn dolly schools are run on the third weekend of each month, and other crafts are now being catered for too including fabric painting and spinning. There will be others in due course. Most weekends there is a craftworker in residence demonstrating their skills.

There's a permanent collection of international straw work to be seen; changing exhibitions of art and craft work; and work by other local craft workers for sale.

Group visits - which also include light refreshments - are proving very popular in the evenings, so if you're interested in arranging such an event then give Dorothy a call on Preston 628036. Small groups of handicapped people have also been involved in daytime workshops.

The shop (open each day except Monday, 10am - 5pm) is situated in the old Taberner's shop on the corner of Kittlingbourne Brow, and right opposite "The Mill Tavern". Going even further back, the building was originally the Reading Rooms of Dewhurst's Mill, and it's interesting to see traces of the original fabric still around. Old photos of Higher Walton, and the building itself, add to the interest.

Another Craft Centre to open up recently is "Grass Roots" at Finney Barr's Farm, Drinkhouse Road, Croston - well worth the effort in searching out. The "house speciality" here is dried flower arranging but they also do a nifty line in hat hire, or they'll modify your own millinery. The work of other local craftworkers is also on sale. Gorge yourself on home-made goodies in the coffee shop, and work it off with a short stroll on Croston Moss! Open Wednesdays to Sundays, 10am - 5pm. Tel: Preston 600221.

A third new-ish craft shop is D & B Crafts at 32 Derby Road, Longridge - quite close to St Wilfrid's Church. Again, a wide variety of goods on offer, and the speciality here is the re-seating of rush-bottomed chairs. You may even have seen Mr Garstang on Preston Flag Market, or at one of the local craft fairs, demonstrating his skill.

As one who has visited all the establishments; known Dorothy Horsfall a number of years; known Harold Rigby most of my life; and had work very well done by Mr Garstang - I can personally recommend that you visit all three!



LIVE REVIEWS

The STRAWBS in Concert. Arcadia Theatre, Llandudno

This was the tour for the Strawbs twenty-fifth anniversary, which made me feel very old - I had no idea they had been going so long! Perhaps you thought they had split up not long after their big hit Part of the Union, but not so!

There was a disappointing turnout for the size of the hall, but that didn't daunt either the band or the loval audience of 150 who had turned up to see them! As always wherever I have seen them, they gave 110% throughout. The songs were superb, the arrangements excellent and the musicianship magnificent.

The songs presented a good selection from all their albums, including some new songs. The concert was apparently opened by an American Blues group Turkey Leg Johnson, who later turned out to be Strawbs in disguise!

The Strawbs opened with New World followed by The Hangman And The Papist, both written about Northern Ireland and still unfortunately as relevant as they were when they were first written.

The best new song had to be the very poignant Ringing Down The Years written about Sandy Denny who was in the group in the early years. Listen to these words from the chorus:-

And every time I hear your name

My eves moist up with tears

While every song you ever sang

Comes ringing down the years.

All in all, an excellent set, well played and received. I'm looking forward to their Autumn tour, until then I shall have to make do with the new video and album. Let's hope they play a nearer venue next time! Nigel Firth

UPSTAIRS IN A TENT MELLING TITHEBARN 30.01.93

This was the first of Maghull Folk Club's 1993 series of concerts at the Melling Tithebarn. An excellent line-up was on offer, due mainly to Dave Day's admirable policy of putting on something for everyone By the time the concert kicked off at 7.30pm the place was packed.

Th' Antiques Roadshow opened with a sparkling set of songs and tunes, some traditional and others self

behold - nothing complicated to distract from the voices. They also have a great knock of getting the audience to join in. We are very fortunate to have a group as good as this in our area - If you want to hear more I am sure they would like to see you at their club in Preston on Mondays.

Next on was Cyril Tawney, and I have to say I was disappointed. It must be about 12 years since I last saw Cyril perform and in those days I was always enamoured by his wistful, laid-back approach. At Melling, he was so laid back he made Dave Burland look like Ozzy Osborne!! His guitar was out of tune from the first song, (with little attempt to tune it up), the presentation was lack-lustre, and generally just seemed to go through the motions. No-one can deny his immense contribution over the years, but I for one was disappointed with his performance.

All was not lost however. That fine young couple George and Joan Gallimore gave us a rivetting performance of Lancashire humour, filthy songs, warmth and, above all, a demonstration of why people sing - because they enjoy it! George's rendition of The Great Brewers' Droop makes me laugh every time I hear it - and I must have heard it at least 20 times! They began 1993 in the same way they ended 1992 - loved by everyone!!

So to the top of the bill - Upstairs In A Tent, an immensely talented young group from the North of Ireland for only their second appearance in England. Despite their percussionist phoning them three days before to say he had left the band, and the Bodhran player being ill during the day, they didn't let anyone down. Their musicianship was a joy to behold, the arrangements exciting and original; they came across as enjoying what they were doing. The instrumental line-up included Keyboards, Guitar, Flute, Whistle, Fiddle, Harp and Bodhran. Eamon McElholm demonstrated what a fine songwriter he is by performing a couple of his own songs, plus fine renditions of The Lakes of Pontchartrain and Paul Brady's The Island. Each set of tunes from the band was well thought out, whether a slow air, jigs reels or polkas. One aspect that caught my eye was the Flute/Whistle player using a head-mike; it was great to see how technology can be sensibly used for all the right reasons. I do have a couple of reservations regarding the overall sound - I feel that at times another lead instrument would not have gone amiss eg. Pipes, as the Fiddle and Flute/Whistle are not the most powerful of instruments to put against such a strong backing line-up. I would also have liked to hear a wider vocal aspect involving the whole band. These are only small points and are at a personal level. The band went down tremendously with the audience, penned. These lads get better each time I hear them; 22 who screamed for more at the end. Another superb. Their harmonies and accompaniment are a joy to 22 who screamed for more at the end. Another superb. Irish band to follow so many that have enthraled us

over the years (Planxty, The Bothy Band, De Danann, Four Men & A Dog, Garva (who?) etc.). Let us hope it will not be too long before they grace us with their presence again.

All' in all, a tremendous night all round. I must mention Hudson Swan who did an excellent job on sound, Kathryn Tickell for being there, and Dave Day, without whom these concerts would never happen!

EDITOR'S NOTE: This review was first published in America's folk magazine, "Dirty Linen" - but as it is about one of the North-West's own musicians, we thought you might like the opportunity to read an extract.

THE BLACK FAMILY

Great American Music Hall San Francisco, California, USA July 29,

It was amazing. It was magic. It was all those cliches that the editor cannot abide us using. The Black Family, perhaps the first family of song in Ireland, took to the Great American Music Hall stage in San Francisco for two SRO performances in July. These five tremendously talented individuals, who just happen to be related, deliver some of the most engaging and beautiful harmonies you could ever hope to hear.

The family had gathered together in a rare reunion to celebrate the wedding

of Michael. And that festive occasion allowed several hundred lucky Bay Area residents the opportunity to see something usually reserved for people in Ireland.

The format of the show rotated each family member into the centre spotlight, with vocal support from the others. This arrangement afforded the audience the opportunity to sample the distinctive styles of Mary, Michael, Frances, Shay and Martin as well as to hear the stunning harmonies. In between, we were treated to the good-natured bantering between siblings as they teased Michael on his impending nuptials.

First in the spotlight was Shay, who led off the program with a rousing acapella rendition of the shanty Eliza Lee accompanied by his enthusiastic siblings. Shay, who plays with the quartet Garva as well as the shanty-singing Stormalong John at home in Liverpool, is a wealth of information about the 23 songs sung by the family, especially the shanties.

With his introductions, he was able to enlighten about the origin of the songs in a manner that was as amusing as it was informative.

Michael stepped forward next with The Broom of The Cowden Knowes. The song is a regular in Michael's repertoire and his performance this night not only demonstrated his beautiful tenor voice at its best, but also showed his considerable talent at arranging songs for their maximum impact. With Working on the Midnight Mail, Michael confirmed that he can make an audience laugh as effortlessly as he makes them sigh.

The performance continued with Martin's spirited singing of Jez Lowe's composition Old Bones, Mary with a soulful version of Will Ye Gang Love and Frances belting out the tribute to "James Connelly". Martin, who operates a bicycle shop in Dublin and is well known around that city's session scene, provides the baritone harmony when he is not taking the lead. I thought he could not outdo his passionately sorrowful rendering of Since Maggie Went Away until he took the stage for the encore with a powerful

performance of The Old Triangle.

Frances, who is known for her singing with Arcady and who is now performing with Irish singer/ songwriter Kieran Goss, just keeps getting better and better with every concert.

Mary Black has one of the purest voices singing anywhere in the world today. Nowhere was that more evident than when she stepped forward to sing the heartrending Rose of Allendale. Mary

tends to favour the strong contemporary songs of the best of the Irish songwriters in her solo performances these days: songs like Jimmy McCarthy's No Frontiers which she delivered flawlessly and beautifully. So it was a very special treat to hear her dip back into her repertoire of traditional songs with Allendale.

When you have such distinctive and immensely talented individuals sharing the stage, you can become hard-pressed to decide where the highlights were. There are no lows. This family, which someone said had been singing together longer than the Grateful Dead, is close. That warmth and closeness translates into an uncanny ability to shade their harmonies to provide the maximum effect.

Frazer Hines said he had never been to a folk club before and he was really enjoying the atmosphere.

FYLDE FOLK FESTIVAL

The only bad thing about Fylde Folk Festival is the M6, especially on a Friday evening when Blackpool illuminations are switched on - but it is worth every minute. There is something rather special about the atmosphere that has nothing to do with the sea air. The spacious Marine Hall foyer is a natural gathering place to meet old, and make new friends between events.

There are a variety of good venues, one of the most entertaining being the Market Tavern cellar on a Friday night. I don't think I have ever been to a folk event with bouncers before. They arrived quietly around 10.30pm closely followed by a cross section of the local youth, who although a little taken aback by Beggars Velvet performing on their dance floor caused no problems and kept quiet. At midnight the cellar turns into a nightclub - a sort of 1990's cinderella in reverse. (The Tavern also does humungous sandwiches at lunch time!). Back to the festival, events start and end on time which is a definite plus. Another plus is that with the odd exception, guests appear for the full weekend, and with so many events running concurrently, you are sure to catch most people somewhere sometime.





The guest list was as always impressive and too numerous to mention all. Some of my favourites were Lewis Pint & Dale from Canada who did an excellent hour with, Melanie Harrold & Ollie Blanchflower for something different and classy, and Les Lapins, particularly their Breton material, for which I have a special affection.

Saturday lunch time was **perfick** - picnicking in the Marine Gardens with a bottle of wine watching Feet First. Their energy and exuberance drew people from all round and passers by came down from the promenade. All were held spellbound by the excellence of the music and dance.

I had to leave before the final concert, but I have it on good authority that Stockton's Wing more than equalled the afternoon performance.

1993 sees Fylde's 21st birthday. Get your weekend tickets early, they always sell out!


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
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RECORD REVIEWS

JEZ LOWE - "BACKSHIFT" **FELLSIDE FE CD 89**

To quote from the sleeve notes "The songs of Jez Lowe are the songs of his native North East England. of the people and places, their loves and their lives." I can't sum it up better than that myself; I'm quite a recent convert to Jez Lowe, although I know his songs sung by other singers.

These tracks were therefore nearly all new to me, so I very much enjoyed this retrospective. If you have all

his LP's there will be nothing new here, although it is certainly the first time on CD for most of these tracks. Two songs Black Diamonds and The Ballad of Johnny Collier are re-recorded in new versions specially for this compilation.

He has undoubtedly matured as a songwriter over the years, but even his earliest songs can be just as powerful as his latest ones. He write some very powerful "message" songs, and vet is still able to portray that message with a little humour. Listen to this example from The High Part of The Town:-

Our house is not so crowded Since me mam she ran away, She'd rather live from hand to mouth Than live from day to day.

Well me father's often lonely, But it's a blessing in disguise, It's cured me mothers headaches And it's cured me dads black eyes.

Other favourites are the rather apposite Ballad of Johnny Collier written about an earlier coalfield rundown, the very cleverly written Japs & English which compares some of the conflicts down the years with children's playground games, and The Old Durham Road about the Jarrow March.

All in all, and excellent album and well worth buying either for the convert who wants copies of his early songs on CD or for the more recent convert who simply wants to hear more of him.

As with most of the recent Fellside releases on CD, 28 Derek Gifford excellent value for money with 17 tracks and well

over an hour's playing time. (This release is unusually only available on CD.) Well done Paul Adams! Nigel Firth

CHRIS WOOD AND ANDY CUTTING: "Lisa"

Ruf Records - RUF CD002

When I first heard Chris Wood and Andy Cutting on a

"Folk on Two" broadcast some time ago, I was impressed by their obvious enthusiasm and easy going style as well as their superb musicianship. Chris plays guitar and violin and Andy plays the melodeon. Chris also sings the three songs on the album. There are some cracking tunes here, mainly Traditional and generally having an English feel to them. However, a number of them were gleaned from a visit to Quebec three vears ago, and these have a strong cajun influence in them. All the tunes have been arranged by Chris and Andy with a great deal of sensitivity. Barry Coope's skills on the

keyboard have been enlisted in some tracks to give a little more depth to these arrangements.

Chris sings When I First Came To Caledonia with a rather too laid back style for me but, though his singing is not likely to set the world on fire, he has a pleasant and listenable-to voice. The more bluesy style of Out Come the Freaks suits his voice better. The Silver Swan is a song simply credited to Gibbons, about whom I would have liked to know more. This leads me to my one criticism of the package in that, whilst the cover is very stylishly presented, the sleeve notes tend to be somewhat inadequate with regard to the songs. The background to the tunes, however, is perhaps understandably. slightly more comprehensive.

However this is an extremely minor criticism and certainly does not, I hope, detract from my obvious delight at being asked to review such a fine CD. The lads can be seen at many of this years folk festivals, so look out for them - I certainly will.

HEATHER HEYWOOD "By Yon Castle Wa"

Greentrax - CDTRAX054

I always think, wrongly or rightly, that the real test of a singer is when they sing unaccompanied. As far as Heather Heywood is concerned she is at the master's degree level. I'm always a little wary of reviewing Scottish revival singers in case the accent is too thick for me to cut through, but in the case of Heather, she is one who can remain "Scottish" without being unintelligible to an ignorant sassenach like myself. Her tonal quality, timbre and delivery of lyric is almost faultless. Technical perfection of course requires a few more ingredients if it is to be enhanced above the "technically perfect but boring" syndrome and this Heather does with her conviction and emotional input to the songs.

As if wooing the listener with her fine voice wasn't sufficient, she then enlists the help of ex-Battlefields Brian McNeill and Dougle Pincock to accompany a number of the songs. I say "enlists" but I get the feeling that they fell over themselves to be of assistance. especially as Brian was the overall producer, and they play Dougle's tune Mistress Heywood's Fancy as "a gift to Heather for this CD". Other (hardly "also ran") accompanists are Quadrille's lain Goodwin on guitar, Coelberg's Colin Matheson on piano and Ron Shaw who adds a lovely extra dimension to the accompaniments with his fine cello playing.

With such a wealth of talent and fine songs it's difficult to pick out any one track above the others, but amongst the most memorable are I Hae But Son enhanced by Dougie's rendition of The Wandering Piper that follows it, and MacCrimmon's Lament. Of the unaccompanied songs I like especially The Corncake Amang the Whinnie Knowes (well I would of course, there's a fairly rare bird in the title!). Of the well known classics Ave Wakin O is superbly arranged for quitar and fiddle accompaniment. I could go on - but words are inadequate. To appreciate the sheer beauty of this album you'll just have to buy it and listen to it yourself.

DEREK GIFFORD "A Mixed Case"

Fellside - FSC6 (TAPE)

Derek's is the sort of release that "Folk Roots" with its smug elitism would instantly relegate to its "and the rest" section yet performers like Gifford are the 20 Robust Stuff indeed! very backbone of the folk scene (still thriving despite

regular reported fatalities) that gives you and I so much pleasure - this tape certainly gave me a great deal of satisfaction.

Derek Gifford's name should be familiar to most local readers of this magazine as the MC/figurehead/ resident of Croston's Yarrow Valley Club and his credentials as a semi-professional artist/general activist are well established. Suffice to say that there are few matters "folk" in our area in the last 20 years or so that haven't involved Derek directly or indirectly. As a national festival guest and gigster too I seem to see him on an increasing number of listings, so that this new collection of 12 songs can only add fuel to his flaming reputation! (did I really write that?!).

Giff's repertory is largely Traditional or influenced by the Tradition, by which I mean that if a credit isn't "Trad. Arr" then the writers he favours are those who work sounds Trad. or adheres to Trad. themes. Tom

> Lewis' Recall is a good example of the latter. There is a shared composing credit on one song -Packhorse Inn (actually not my best-loved cut) with Keith Scowcroft - a writer I know Derek admires whose Stallion Master a tale of trickery on the Solway Sands is also included.


Derek's guitar playing is good throughout, his famous bowed psaltery adding nice atmospherics where appropriate, and though at times perhaps his solo voice comes across as stereotypical folkie, it is never at odds with his material. Chris Harvey's keyboards are tastefully used on some tracks as are the chorus vocal of Alison Younger from First Principals, and Pete and

Judith Gleave of Quartz, with Paul (Producer) and Linda Adams filling out songs such as the impressive sea themes/shanties which dominate the second side, with rather good and certainly full harmonies. In fact I loved Jan Rebeck (who is the Russell who wrote it?). If I have any major criticism here, it would be an absence of factual notes on the insert which would have answered that question. Les Barker's brief essay is amusing but there are some songs ("Ledbury Parson" is one) which are new to me and I would like to know more about 'em! I was spoilt you see by Bert Lloyd's illumination on early Topic albums I'm afraid. Owl of Oldham too is one of my favourites in this set. Lovely melody, empathetic synth. work from Chris, the right amount of reverb - it all comes together perfectly on this one for me.

In conclusion then, an interesting and commendable cassette. Full-bodied, fruity and vigorous. There is an occasional Vin De Pays but enough Pinot Noir and Cabernet Sauvignon varieties to make this mixed case well worthy of investigation.

"SCOTLAND NOW" - A GREENTRAX SHOWCASE

Since 1986, Greentrax Records have been at the forefront of recording "the full breadth of Scotlands musical heritage". In compiling this taster, Ian Green has put together a selection of talented artists, working the Folk Clubs, Festivals and Concert circuit. I wonder why companies send out these samplers. Is it to whet your appetite and make you buy the recording of that particular artist or perhaps make you want to book them for your club or festival? I wouldn't imagine you would do either of these from listening to one track.

The question is then: does it stand up as a CD of various artists? On the whole, I think it does. As with all recordings, it has its high and low spots. It would be unfair to pick out, I feel, the poorer tracks (there are not many). The high spots for me are: Brian McNiells wonderful fiddle playing, the McCalman's sensitive treatment of Who Pays The Piper, Catherine-Ann MacPhee's Gaelic song I see Winter (a beautiful voice) and I wish I was in Glasgow a rare serious song by Billy Connolly, performed by lain Mackintosh. I hope the CD is sensibly priced in order to attract new listeners.

PETE CASTLE "The Cottage by the Shore"
Steel Carpet - MATS0006
CASSETTE AND BOOKLET

My only previous contact with Pete Castle has been as an owner of his "Cellar Tape" which was a demo to illustrate his capabilities as a live performer. In the meantime he has recorded several cassettes, both of songs and stories, but this is his first mainstream album for some time. The influences are apparent from the very first song, **The Banks of Green Willow** where elements of Nick Jones, Nick Dow, Martin Carthy and Roy Harris surface.

In his accompanying booklet he admits these influences (with the exception of Nick Dow who was almost certainly influenced by Nick Jones anyway). Reading through the aforementioned list it will soon become apparent to you, dear reader, that Mr Castle is a purveyor of Traditional songs. However, on this album, there is an example of his other forte, that of storytelling, in Willie's Lady - a version of this story can also be found in song form. Pete has a pleasant style of singing and is an accomplished guitar player very much in the Nick Jones mould.

His treatment of traditional song is sincere and sympathetic but for some reason this album fails to impress, whereas I enjoyed his "Cellar Tape" very much. Perhaps it is the lack of the atmosphere of a live performance that it the problem, or perhaps it is because, apart from his own **The Ballad of Mr Leakey**, which I didn't like anyway, there are no new traditional songs here, a mere re-working of some excellent and well known standards. My one regret is that I didn't get to see him at Bury Folk Club on January 9th - probably because I was too busy writing this and other reviews!

The package of cassette and booklet is comprehensive, giving words, music and background to the songs, and competitively priced at £6 per set for the cassette and £2 for the booklet if purchased separately. Available from Steel Carpet Music at 190 Burton Road, Derby, DE1 1TQ.

I really must stop writing reviews and go to see more performers live!

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The CD gives us 14 tracks of Jigs, Polkas, Marches, Hornoipes and a Country Waltz emanating from

The CD is purely instrumental but is so well collected and put together that it never becomes boring. The package gives you a well documented booklet full of information to each tune, along with individual portraits of the Band, wrinkles and all.

For those of you who have not been privileged to tune your ears to their sound yet, then go out and risk them on a copy without delay, you will not be disappointed.

RANKIN FILE - "For The Record"

This is a re-issue of 2 LP's, "Mr Sax" and "Rankin File" together with 2 unreleased tracks, all recorded in the early 1970's, Rankin File were a full time professional band during 1971 and 1973 appearing at Folk Clubs, concerts and Festivals. The three piece band, lain Rankin (song writer and guitarist from Canada), Rick Nickerson (playing Bass, also from Canada) and Tony Mitchell (Guitar from Scotland).

I don't really remember this group (mind you it is a long time ago). My research has discovered that they were well thought of and that their reputation came before them. As Iain Rankin lived in Canada, chances to see them were few and far between. The songs on the CD are, I suppose, typical of that era and to me now seem rather dated. Perhaps two of the best known songs are Call on Me and Mr Sax sung by the McCalmans, the Houghton Weavers and Pat Ryan (she made me write that). I wondered why this had been re-issued but the clues are on the sleeve. lain Rankin is back in Scotland and writing songs 32 again. New recording soon?

TONY QUINN "From a Foreign Part of the Town" **Appraisal Records - APPR CD1**

After playing this CD two or three times. I still ended up coming to the same conclusion, that, apart from the odd track, it does little for me. To begin with, the voice has the same agonizing sound on every track. a la Neil Young. Most of the songs are obviously personal to the artist - If you are going to share them and wish people to listen to them, you should make them sound more attractive to the listener, I don't mind having to or wanting to listen to other people's experiences in song format, but I do want to be entertained at the same time (That's why I never invite Leonard Cohen to any of my parties!). There are a couple of tracks that did appeal to me -Alabama Shoe-Shine Boy, a song about the great negro athlete Jesse Owens - Re-kindle the Flame, a song of self belief and bouncing back.

The backing musicianship on all the track is excellent, though sometimes overdone, and the production I can't fault. I don't know much about the singer, apart from the fact he writes all his own material and hails from the Widnes area. His lyrics at times are very clever - if only the melodies were equal to them.

Not a bad first effort from a local talent, but any future ones will need to be more attractive and wide-ranging to grab my attention.

I remember seeing Mark T with the Brickbats at Maghull Folk Club two or three years ago. I didn't think then that anything special was on offer, apart from the odd experiment with rhythm and sounds, and I reserved judgement. When this album was given to me to review, and I saw the list of titles, I was quite looking forward to listening.

Songs include Cherry Stone (wrongly credited to Mark T - surely this is the same song as I Gave My Love A Cherry?), Pretty Sarah, The Seeds of Love, Loving Nancy, Nottamun Town, etc. Now you think that amongst that lot there would be something to enthuse over - not a bit of it!! The arrangements are poorly crafted, the singing is out of tune, the phrasing is all over the place, and an experiment to put new life into what are mostly well known traditional songs just hasn't worked.

In fact the opposite has resulted. The arrangements detract from what is basically an excellent collection of songs. If people do these things just to be different, then it is up to them, but in this instance it defeats the object. Some people might like it - Ashley Hutchings does!!! For me, I have got to say no, Mark.

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
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
