☐Come Through The Open Door

Some 12 years ago the Open Door Folk Club was started at the Crime View in Daisy Nook Country Park in Failsworth near Oldham. Since those early days the Club has gained a reputation for two things - its policy of supplying a platform for all aspects of folk music and song - professionals and amateurs get the same treatment, and secondly the quality of singing from the audience. Recently the Club moved to its new home at the Star Inn, Church St, Failsworth, where it now has its own room, small stage, bar (and barman Vic!) and is thriving. Singers Nights are held every Sunday at 8:30 pm, with the exception of one Sunday per month when an international guest is booked. There is a healthy variety of songs and music, including Contemporary, Traditional, Blues, Music hall, Sea Songs, Comedy, Prose, Monologues, Gospel and Jigs. The Open Door policy is that if you want to perform - you can, and this leads to an average of 15 - 30 singers and performers most nights.

There is also a social side to the Club, with long weekends away for folk holidays. There are also concerts in other venues, Club Swap nights and Books, Magazines, Records and tapes are available for sale and loan. Visitors are made to feel very welcome and nobody stays a stranger for very long. There is easy access for the handicapped.

The Club is currently organising a weekend away at Lindisfarne (Holy Island) on 20th - 22nd Oct. The hotel is fully booked, but bed & breakfast is available at other hotels on the island. INTERVIEW:

Chris While talks to

GRRVR

When I was first asked to do an interview with this band from Liverpool who are riding so high at the moment, I thought it would be a great way to pass an hour or so with some old friends and fellow muso's, so it was with pleasure that I rounded up the boys in the beer tent at Chester Festival for a chat.

The band comprises of Tony Gibbons (Citternand vocals), John Murphy (Uilleann Pipes, Banjo, Guitar and vocals), Kevin Webster (Button Accordion), Terry Coyne (Flute, Whistles and vocals) and Steve Higham (Guitar and vocals). The band have been promoting their latest CD "Sweet Liberty" on Redwood Records (RED

CD008), so they are well played in, as they say, and sounding polished and professional but still incredibly fresh. I called in the marquee for their afternoon set and was impressed, as usual, by the standard of musicianship and harmonies (oh those harmonies).

CW: There is an obvious rapport on stage so the first question to the band has to be are you really such good friends?

"Oh yes" says John, "we've known each other for such a long time, for instance, I played in a band with Kevin's dad, so that's how long I've known him. I think the biggest contributing factor to our enjoyment is that we're not a fully professional band, we all have jobs

(not bad these days!!) so the band is still a hobby to a certain extent." "It would have to be a few years down the line," says Tony, "before we could even think about giving up our day jobs, you know how it is, with families, mortgages and all."

Indeed I do, it wasn't until I was in my mid thirties and firmly ensconced in the Albion Band that I could consider music to be my only way of making a living! I found out the history and background of the individual members. They're all of Irish decent in some way and are all from the Liverpool area, apart from Kevin who hails from Blackburn. The first line up of the band was formed in 1978. Back then it was just Tony, John and Shay Black who left the band last year to live in America. Of course Shay will be missed by all in the region and by his mates in the band but I have to say Steve Higham's vocals are soooo sweet and fit in with the others, in fact sometimes it's difficult to tell the vocals apart when the harmonies are flowing. He's a fine rhythm guitarist too.

"I played with Mike Lennon up until recently"

reflects **Steve**, "eight years altogether" he scratches his head, "eight years" he repeats, "It only seems like four." He chuckled like you do when you realise you're older than you think you are.

I asked Terry about his background.

"I've always played music for as long as I can remember" he says, "My dad and my brothers are all musicians and we played together for eighteen years in the Liverpool Ceilidh band." A little gleam comes to his eye when he mentions his Dad Eamon. I asked him (Terry) if he still played in the aforementioned band? "Well Garva are doing really well now and all the lads

are fully committed to the band."

CW: I heard some years ago Tony, that you picked up the cittern one day and in about six months you were brilliant?

TG: "Well actually it was a mandolin, I got bored just sitting around with nothing to play so I picked up the mandolin, later I bought a cittern and I've never looked back."

Yorkshire Dales Bluegrass Festival / Pete Ryder at Swinton

4th Yorkshire Dales Bluegrass Festival

Dalesbank Farm, Silsden

Isn't it just great when you come across an unexpected nugget? First visit for me to this warm, friendly musically wondrous weekend, set on a farm above Keithley with great views and lovely air for those getting a bit short of "puff"!!

Two interlinked bars with the amazing cacophony that can arise when six or seven

impromptu sessions all insist on playing their own "tune" at the same time - all that plus Samuel Smith's nectar! Next door - the concert room built into a barn with sound handled as competently as ever by Steve Rusby.

Stars of the weekend -"Tim & Mollie O'Brien" prior to concerts in Ireland and an appearance at the Cambridge Folk Festival. Tim was a founder member of "Hot Rize" a late lamented Bluegrass band, but here he was with sister Mollie, a singer of striking range and clarity whose blues singing raised the hairs on the back of this old neck! The duo format allowed Tim to demonstrate the full range of his prodigious talents songwriter, singer, fid-

dler, mandolin player and guitarist. I've never seen anyone better.

If you see them advertised on their next UK visit - go see 'em - even if they are the other side of the country. Think of it as a pilgrim to excellence.

But - Bluegrass festivals are really boring are'nt they? Everything sounds the same does'nt it?

Well I heard traditional Bluegrass, contemporary Bluegrass, Irish, Cajun, Skiffle, Rock 'n Roll, Blues, even some jazz and a great comedy find "The Duffy Brothers", every bit as good as "Maxie & Mitch" at their best, with bits just as zany as the "Old Rope String Band". On top of that they are both consummate musicians and Raymond has a great voice!!

4 years on the road in the USA, toured as part of the "Charlie Pride Roadshow" but now back home in Peterbrough. If the bigger folk festivals

> don't pick these lads up the organisers will be really missing out.

Pete Ryder Swinton Folk Club

I have known Pete Ryder for more years than I really care to remember but every time I see him play I am always struck by the freshness and quality of his performance.

He is an out and out blues man who prefers to shun the electronic wizardry of electric guitars and accessories in favour of a purer acoustic sound.

Pete's introduction to jazz and blues came through his father's record collection. His natural aptitude on the guitar led to him being something of a celebrity at the MSG (in the late 1960's).

In the years since then Pete was befriended by such notables as Derek Brimstone and Alex Campbell and toured America and Europe gaining recognition for the fine musician and composer that he is.

To some extent Pete "dropped out" of the music circuits for a few years until about 4 or 5 years ago when I met him again at Fylde a few minutes before he was due to appear in a concert. Pre-show nerves effect virtually every performer and Pete is no exception but there is no trace of such nerves once he starts to play and sing and his delivery is smooth and relaxed. Laid back enough to be entertaining but not so laid back that he would be in danger of falling off the stool!

Pete's well crafted songs are based upon his memories and experience. One of the most requested of his songs is "In Nat Shapiro's Time", In the introduction Pete explains that the song to some extent is dedicated to his father and his father's knowledge of the jazz and blues musicians of the 1940's and 50's.

"On A Caravan" is a song that Pete wrote especially for Derek Brimstone. Although I recognise the song I did not appreciate until that moment when Pete played it that it was a song that he had written.

Most of us have suffered the loss of a friend through illness or perhaps through accident and would have liked perhaps to have created a song in their memory. Pete has most certainly achieved this in the song he has dedicated to Alex Campbell and another friend of his in the touching "The Sky Has Come Between Us Once Again".

Although the words of Pete's songs have been well thought out they are to some extent overshadowed by the quality and dexterity of his guitar playing. Comment from guitarists watching Pete's performance do not usually remark upon the fact he played things well but more on what he played and how he played it. If you talk to Pete about his playing he will candidly tell you that if he plays then he wants to play to the best of his ability and anything less is just not good enough.

If you team up the quality of his writing, the excellence of his playing, his relaxed performance sprinkled with stories of his experiences both happy and sad you have, in my view, a perfectly satisfying evening's entertainment.

The members of the audience comprising the full house at the Swinton Folk Club most certainly shared my view. There are not many artists who are asked to play an encore at the end of their first set!

Although originally born in Salford, Pete now lives in Bolton and he runs guest evenings twice a month at the Howcroft Inn in Bolton.

Pete is now looking forward to recording his first solo album for some years. I suspect that once available it may go into reprint.

If you are a club or festival organiser I strongly recommend that you try and get along to Pete's shows and book him without hesitation. Even if you cannot get along to one of Pete's shows I would recommend that you give him a call and book him anyway. The contact number is:-01204 847190.

The only way you will find out whether this review is hype of truth will be for you to go out and see Pete Ryder for yourself.

SISTERS UNLIMITED "No Bed of Roses"

Fellside FECD 104

For those who don't know, Sisters Unlimited are: Rosie Davis, Sandra Kerr, Janet Russell and Peta Webb, all named you will probably recognise individually but, perhaps not collectively. Here they present material all the way from Leon Rossleson to Nashville. Sixteen tracks of predominantly unaccompanied singing but featuring guitar, dulcimer, percussion, concertina and feet!

I've always said that you must be very brave to

include lots of unaccompanied material on a C.D. unless you are sure that what you've presented is spot on: in this case it is. All the singing is first rate, the voices blending really well, providing some excellent harmonies. The vocals interweave, sharing lead vocals and show that a lot of thought has gone into the arrangements. You can tell by the feeling in the singing that they really are enjoying what they are doing. As a personal preference I would have preferred more tracks with backing.

All the tracks work well but my favourites are "Women

O' Dundee", a Shena Wellington song, beautifully sung by Janet Russell, "Chilbirth Shanty", not for the faint of heart, or pregnant and "Your Cheating Heart".

An often thought provoking C.D. full of fine singing and excellent harmonies.

To be good the artist has to have the skills of a standard to be considered a professional as a lyricist, a musician, a melodicist, a singer, a public performer, a business person, a driver and an "Artist".

Tim Rice just writes words, Lloyd Webber just writes

music, John Williams just plays guitar, Sir Clifford just sings...and so on. But we all demand things of the singer songwriter and no person can be all things equally, except the very very best. So, when I listen to a person brave enough to give it a go on all levels I mentally award points in the following categories.

✓ 1 Words

✓ 2 Melody

✓ 3 Musicianship

√ 4 Vocal Ability

√5 Presentation

6 Feel

Like all of us Steve Tilston scores higher in some categories than other, but the overall total is healthy.

He is a fine musician with a good sense of melody rooted clearly in the blues and the tradition. The feel is good, the presentation and recording excellent. If Steve has a weakness, it lies in his voice which is not one of the strongest, but which is pleasing enough, except on one track "Goodbye to the Snow" where it is particularly uncertain.

However, songs like "Soon Comes the Rain" with its sudden outbursts of exuberant South American sounds,

"Hideaway" with its incisive lyrics about current times, and "Don't blame the wind" with its irresistible chorus make this an album I will reach for again.

Two instrumental tracks get the toes tapping, and the overall feel is one of relaxed pleasure.

Maggie Boyle does her thing with flute, Harmonium and Bhodran and Richard Curran adds some excellent violin. Chris Newman co-produces and plays bass and piano.

So here we have an album I would not classify as heavyweight, but which does succeed in what it sets out to do which is to bring you the music of a multi talented performer who can be enjoyed with confidence.

CLIVE GREGSON "People and Places"

I had been wondering what had happened to Clive when I met him again at Holmfirth Festival. He now lives in Nashville and had come across to promote the new C.D. and do a tour.

I thought that this C.D. might have a country feel to it now Clive lives in the home of country music but none of it. In fact, some of the tracks have an English traditional feel about them.

The backing is kept on the whole to a minimum with just three other musicians involved: Martin Hughes, Drums and percussion, Ruary McFarlane, Bass and Andy Whelan, Guitar.

The C.D kicks off with "Camden Town" a love story for an Irish girl that Clive describes as "total imperfection", a wonderful song with strong lyrics and melody. The whole album is full of songs that I would describe as "instantly nickable": in fact we've learned one already. I could mention all the tracks but I'd run out of superlatives. However, the highlights for me are: "My Eves Gave The Game Away", a song about saying one thing and really meaning another, "Box Number", tells us about replying to

lonely hearts adverts and "My Favourite Lies". A special mention

should be made for "Mary's Divorce", what a clever song! Clive has taken the idea and chorus from "Mairi's Wedding" (The Lewis Bridal song) and set the scene for the divorce.

So there you have it, you've got a C.D. full of strong well crafted singable songs that is a joy to listen to. Stop reading this now and go and buy it!

ROBIN GARSIDE "The Ragman's Trumpet"

Back in the early 70's, I used to run a club in Doncaster, one of three successful clubs in the town. We had to work hard to get "Bums on Seats" and chose the acts carefully. One of our "certainties" was Robin Garside and Paul Gough. Sadly the duo split and went on to do other things (as well as playing with those rookers Shagpile).

Let's start by saying that Robin is a very talented multi-instrumentalist and a thoroughly nice bloke. On this recording he plays

acoustic and electric guitars, violin, banjo, Mandolin, Bass and percussion (I hate talented people!) What

help he does have comes from Paul Gough and Sharon Fountain on backing vocals and Neil Jolly on recorders. There are 15 tracks that pull together a mixture of styles from Traditional Folk through Blues and include a piece from 1515.

Taking the album as a whole this is Robins showcafe; him saying this is what I can do - and he can do a lot. Four of the tunes and songs are self-penned.

The songs with Paul Gough on backing vocals really take me back to the Doncaster days and the magic they had between them then; my favourite being "Rout of the Blues". Of the self-penned material, "Vulcan Road" stands out, a song lamenting the decline of industry and the destruction of the soul of a town. I could pick others but I'd be here all day.

Next time you see Robin, stop him and buy one, better still book him, better still do both!

3 CD's of music by comparatively young artists, all simply gorgeous to listen to, beautifully played and skilfully arranged. There the similarities end; each has their own highly developed style and approach, all are well worth looking out for.

The Famous Five are a Bristol based group who play traditional British and

self-penned pieces on fiddle, piano accordion, mandolin and guitar. This is a fairly straight forward acoustic line up but they use modern influences to put new life into their music producing a dynamic and exciting sound. The arrangements, especially the introductions and start

are tight and impressive.

The first piece "Walking ower da River" from Shetland starts with a


great bit of fiddle playing then "develops" as the rest of the band join in. Mr Preston's Hornpipe, a NW tune, also gets this treatment to good effect. Tony's tune is a French bouree in its other life but here again it gets the full treatment to create an eastern european feel. The self-penned pieces are also excellent.

Jennifer & Hazel Wrigley are Orkadian twins now based in Edinburgh who draw on a diverse range of influences including Scots, Irish, Cape Breton and Country! Jennifer is a first class fiddler and Hazel's accompaniment on guitar and piano superb. The intuitive interplay between the two and the sophisticated, vibrant and even humorous approach are quite something to hear. Many of the pieces are written by Jennifer including "Bison Reel" and "Haggis Fondue" all great tunes. "Jim & Svlvia Barnes" again written by Jennifer opens a set with some lovely accompaniment and a sharp change in pace to the traditional Green Hill of Tyrone and Trip to Windsor from the pen of Cape Breton's D.R.MacDonald while "Paddy's Trip to London" features some lovely harmonies on double tracked fiddles. Guest musicians are also used sparingly to compliment the twins music but never to change its character - if you went to see 26 music offers all the light and shade you could want.

them live having heard the CD you would not be disappointed. Two jigs learnt from the Orkney Strathspey and Reel Society provide an interesting contrast, being playing in a relatively straight style which makes you realise just how inventive some of their other technical ability, watch out for the very clever key changes in John MacNeil's Reel and the variations in the Mason's Apron. "The Watch Stone" written by Jennifer closes the CD. It's a slower piece with some beautiful harmonies which I think may be from the Hardranger fiddle mentioned on the sleeve notes and some very subtle accompaniment.

Karen Tweed & Ian Carr (piano accordion/guitar) have a pretty impressive track record between them having worked with Simon Thoumire, Luke Daniels, The Poozies, Kathryn Tickell Band and others. As a duo they are exquisite and quite obviously enjoy working together. Karen is an All Ireland champion

> several times over, her Irish roots are clearly influential but there is mistake!) and tunes from the pens of musicians such as Alistair Anderson and Andy penned pieces. "Miss Hanoria McNamara of



which says everything you would want to say to your mum and is one of my favourite tracks. "Unstep" is an amazing set which opens with a Hohner melodica (the sort you used to have at school with a small piano keyboard that you blow down to get a noise out) making a sound you would not have thought it possible to create on such an instrument. Karen later plays the Congress Reel on this instrument again proving in the right hands it can sound pretty damn good, so good that until you read the sleeve notes it sounds like a good traditional Irish anglo-concertina player! The Unstep is followed by a wonderful French Canadian tune, Reel Beatrice and then changes into Maurice Lennon's "The Prince's Feather". "Baby Isle of Ewe" is a brilliant composition of lan's so quirky you can't help but smile when you hear it. As a whole it is fractionally more traditional than the first two in this review but conveys every bit as much energy, emotion and excitement. It is an unusual duo which works because of the sheer talent of its two separate halves and the interplay when they come together.

I quite honestly can find no weak point on any of these offerings. All 3 are purely musical and so might find it easier to get live work were they are able to offer song as well but for my personal taste their

Bit of Blues, bit of Honky Tonk, bit of good old Folk. If you can't find anything to pinch from this album to sing at your local folk club you're just not trying! However - if you insist on being able to pigeonhole your music - beware. This is just good stuff, well played and sung!!

This delightful compilation from the singing of half a dozen stalwarts from Kent and Sussex is a real gem. Fourteen songs sung without a trace of artifice from the heart with clarity and sincerity.

Listening to each track in this collection in-

stantly brings back memories of other "Old Times" such as Fred Jordan and the late Johnny Doughty; singers capable of

making an old and sometimes hackneyed song sound fresh and vibrant.

Here the six singers Bob Copper, Ron Spicer, Louie Fuller, Bob Lewis, Gordon Hall and John Copper present a mix of love songs, ballads and Music Hall songs - also included is the historical oddity "The Grand Conversation on Napoleon" (an English broadside which supports Napoleon's cause - apparently it was not that unusual in SE England in the early 19th century). You could say that this CD has something

for everyone who enjoys the traditional songs sung by the unaccompanied voice. It really is a very fine disc with excellent sleeve notes that will enhance your collection. If I must choose my favourite tracks from this album then Louie Fullers twinkling rendition of "Spotted Dick" must be among them along with Ron Spicers "Constant Lovers", Bob Coppers "The Trees They Do Grow High", John Coppers "The Clothes Horse" and Gordon Hills "Grand Conversation", but the top song for me has to be Bob Lewis' "Searching for Lambs" - a real cracker.

Well done Veteran Tapes and your sponsors, long may you continue. As for you dear reader, this CD is available from all good record shops and festival

music from mainly 20th century composers and adapts it for the mandolin, a much neglected, but in his hands, very versatile instrument. Stunning technique, complete commitment and a deep feel for the music are the characteristics of this album. I urge you to buy it, but only if you are willing to devote to it the level of attention it deserves.



Coming from a family with a history of great pipers born in Cambelltown, Argyll, William McCullom has won no less that twenty premier competitions not surprising considering the fact he has been tutored and playing since the age of 9!

He was the first piper to win the prestigious "Glenfiddich Championship" in successive years and succeeded in winning two sections of the Dr Dan Reid memorial competition in San Fransisco. In addition he was awarded the overall prize "The McClaren Horn

As well as his undoubted solo piping skills he is a member of the premier grade "Scottish Power Pipe Band" he has a Daughter, Hailey whom I presume this album is dedicated to and I'm sure along with his wife Christine and son Scott she will feel very proud of her dad.

For this album recorded in May 1995 and released late July takes piping to another level. With consummate skill and an array of marches, Scottish and Irish airs, jigs and reels he provides sixty minutes of magic for all devotees of the swirl of the pipes. It includes some of his own compositions two of which I particularly like "The White Eyebrow" and "The Piping Poodle". The final track "Rory McLeods Lament" provides one of the highlights and a fitting finale to this innovative album.

If you've ever holidayed or visited Scotland and you wish to recall happy memories sit back now and again, relax and listed to some virtuoso performances from a very talented man.

BOB BUCKLE: Both Sides of the River

B/B & Radio Merseyside CD & Cassette

One of the prime movers of the revival on Merseyside for over two decades, Bob Buckle has been noticeable via his absence from the scene in more recent years, concentrating instead upon his music in education projects. It was very pleasing then, to find a brand mew CD (and cassette) recorded by a brand new Bob Buckle Band in concert at Radio Merseyside earlier this year.

Both Sides of the River July highlights Bob's over-pleasant vocal abilities and his excellent 5 string banjo expertise over a 20 track line selection, but what makes this album doubly interesting is its evident musical honesty and integrity.

Play it once and it will remind you of the enormous influence that American performance played in the British revival. Spin it again and you begin to wonder why has it all but disappeared ... open, warm, accessible... all terms used in the folk scene (perhaps less applicable these days?) and all applicable to Bob Buckle's

Buckle is noted for his and one of the highlights of the album is "Off to Sea Once More" a glorious 6/8 powder-keg of a song. There are other significant moments, however: Seth Davy, Joseph Barer and Whip Jamboree all belong to a great song tradition that has become unfashionable - why?



It comes as no surprise to find the album dedicated to Burl Ives - welcome back, wayfaring strangers!


