

New Book on Folk Song

A new publication from the English Folk Dance & Song Society is called **English Folk Song** - **An Introductory Bibliography** and is by David Atkinson. Forty eight pages of very well researched and well presented material the object of which is 'to serve both as an introduction to the study of English folk song, and as a guide to the numerous collections of songs which exist'. Music Central?

OK so you have a new PC complete with a stonkingly fast Pentium processor, a CD ROM drive, tons of RAM to spare and nothing to do except use your word processor to type items for folk magazines. Well, according to Microsoft at least, you need 'Music Central 97'. This is a new multimedia CD ROM package that contains details on over 80,000 albums, 5,000 reviews. 2.100 photos, 8,000 biographies, more than 70 music clips and 35 minutes of performance footage. The press release insists that the CD covers folk, but I'd be suprised if that amounts to little more than a mention of Bob Dylan and Joan Baez. Typing 'Poozies' into the search facility will probably result in a system crash! Music Central 97 will be available widely in the run-up to Christmas and costs around £30.00.

Redcar Folk Festival



More Club News!

Wiggin Ceilidhs, St Helens Ceilidhs and Knees up North

One of the longest established and most successful regular ceilidhs in the North West ("The Best Ceilidh Club in Britain" stated Bob Adams when he called there in May) and one of the most recently established ... Wiggin and St Helens respectively ... have combined to form one organisation. The new name to look out for is "Knees up North"

The move has come about following the departure to the South of Tim and Jane Brewster who with Mike Moore were organisers of St Helens Ceilidhs. The amalgamation has provided an opportunity to reassess dance provision in this area of the North West. We have decided not to continue the regular dances at St Helens Town Hall after the present series has ended, but to concentrate English Ceilidhs on Ince Public Hall, where they will continue on the second Friday of the month as at present. Already lined up for the coming months are Shake-a-Leg, Katie's Quartet, Jabadaw, The English Country Dance Band, Peeping Tom and hopefully Token Women. Top name callers booked include Mary Panton and Martyn Harvey.

In place of the monthly English Ceilidhs in St Helens, we are starting a new venture for this area - Euroceilidhs. In the first instance we shall be running a series of three on the first Fridays in January, March and May. The first of these will be held at the Legh Arms in Golborne, venues for the others have yet to be finalised and will depend on the demand but will hopefully be in Golborne area for easy access to the M6 and East Lancashire Road. The band for the first dance will be Crashing Bourrees from South Manchester with Cathy Goss from Lancaster providing tuition. The exact format of these evenings has yet to be fixed, but tuition will be available for those who don't know their bourree from their polska.

We are also hoping to promote some more concert and other folk-oriented special occasions. These may feature European Bands and there is the possibility of a dance-based festival in the future. The first of these special events happens in late November when we will be having an early Christmas Party featuring the North's first Aqueilidh - a ceilidh in a swimming pool. There will be ordinary dancing as well for those who don't like getting wet.





I sincerely hope that this is not the case and that this famous club, one that has upheld such high standards for so many years, will be able to continue.



Bromyard, Four Fools Folk Festivals

A FIVERS WORTH OF FOLK (THE BROMYARD FESTIVAL 1996)

Let me explain, my wife Sandy, Rose, Pete and myself arrive on camp at approximately 5:30 Friday evening, half a mile from the centre of Bromyard. Sandy single-handedly got to work putting up our tent. Rose managed hers too and laid on dinner. Around eight o'clock and Pete

and I are still struggling to come to terms with a one-man nylon igloo that refuses all our efforts to transform it into a recognisable tent like shape. Bugger it lets go down the Pub!

A wall of sound hems me in from all sides, trying to talk is useless. Several young Brummies lend MY instruments to the ballyhoo. An elderly gent, with a shopping trolley full of instruments, manoeuvres his way miraculously through a bottle neck of people jamming the pub doorway. Here we are then, in the midst of it all, for the Brummies its their first festi-

We pour out onto the pavement around 11:45. the streets resemble Old Trafford before kick off. People of all denomina-

tions, shapes and sizes. Couples,

groups whole families young and old and the odd single soul singing solo. "No" says a loitering Bobby when I ask him. "Not in the fifteen years I've been here, never been any bother." Who cares about sleeping on fossilized sheep dung? I mean, what are ground sheets for anyway? Who cares about sleeping when neighbouring fields are buzzing with singing and flaming with fires. Five pounds each for the whole weekend can't be bad. Plenty of fresh running water, plenty of sheep, cows, horses and the plaintive air of a didgeridoo echoes on the still night air. (he practices three nights a week in his back garden at Solihull.)

5:30 Saturday morning and I'm up and about. A 20 ards fashionably clipped to their belts. little drowsy, a little headachy, a little queasy but

if I'm meandering a little slow a least I'm not missing anything. The official festival camp-site, professionally erected, lies right next to the official Bromyard cemetery. Bit of an irony that at Thirty-odd quid a throw.

higgeldy piggeldy kind of a place coming to a standstill with the last ice-flow. This England, this deceptive isle.



Friday night opened the festival with a superb singaround and an informal gathering of various Festival guests and local singers.




"Wall of Sound" on Saturday afternoon was fantastic, my head was ringing with the songs. just as it was with the "Shanty Singing".

The Green Fields of France revisited:

TERMINUS PASSENDALE

EDITOR'S NOTE: I publish this exactly as received from Edward Peacock; I wasn't quite sure what to call it,as it isn't quite a "Live Review", and this magazine isn't "Holiday Which" either!

This year my family and I went to France for our holiday. We stayed near Lille, close to the Belgium border and the Battlefields of Flanders. My Dad's friends, the successful singing trio Coope Boyes and Simpson, have become interested in the events of the First World War. They decided to arrange a guided tour with author Piet Chielens, who had just published a book on the subject.

As many soldiers were transported to the front on London double-decker buses, they thought it fitting to use double-decker buses again, this time from Rotherham. So that is how we ended up on a wet Monday evening at Zonnebeke, listening to a rather long address in Flemish, presumably about our route. Then we all got on the buses. My sister and I insisted that we sat on the open-topped bus, not realising that whenever we went under a low tree branch we would have to duck as it swept along the top deck!

Our first stop was the Bremen Redoubt, an underground shelter used by each side in turn as it was captured and recaptured. As always, we were given a commentary in Flemish, then Coope Boyes and Simpson would sing a song. All the time we were being filmed by Belgian TV. The next stop marked the place where gas have first been used and as we watched, Simpson walked slowly from the memorial down an aisle cut through the tall corn, playing a slow air on the bagpipes. As with Coope and Boyes, he is a talented musician as well as a singer.

After driving past several war cemeteries we arrived at the large German Bunker at Zandvoorde. The adults were offered a tot of army rum whilst Coope Boyes and Simpson sang Jerusalem Revisited. We then drove on to Polygon Wood, to find a large cemetery with thousands of white head-stones neatly arranged in rows. Here we were treated to Standing in

By now it was dark and raining, so we were all glad of our next stop, a cafe actually in Passendale. A selection of bread and cheese was enjoyed by everyone and the lucky adults had a glass of Belgian Beer. Coope Boyes and Simpson sang several popular songs from the war before we left for our last stop, the huge Tyne Cot cemetery just outside Passendale.

On the way, there seemed to be some confusion about the route - at one point we appeared to turn around in someone's garden before setting off down a cycle track! We finally arrived and I was amazed by the sheer size of the cemetery. In the dark I could feel the names of missing soldiers engraved on the walls. The last song we heard was Tyne Cot at Night, very movingly sung by torchlight. We travelled back through the darkness to Zonnebeke after a most enlightening and exhilarating tour.

RECORD REVIEWS

THE SHANTY CREW "Where am I to go?"

CD and Cassette BH 9601 - Brewhouse Music, Ely, Cambs, CB7 5XR

There are a growing number of maritime festivals springing up around our coasts.

Events at Liverpool and Cardiff were added this vear to the list of well established weekends at Hull, Lancaster, Swansea and elsewhere.

Very often, as in Bristol 96, the major attraction is not the singers but the location itself, historic

ships, docks etc. It follows that many visitors will not have encountered sea song before.

Chris Roche and his Shanty Crew have co-produced with Brewhouse Music a 75 minute recording which I unreservedly recommend to anyone new to the genre. Each of the 29 tracks has been chosen with care and cover most as-

pects of sea song. All The Shanty Crew get a fair

crack of the whip democratically alternating lead

A bonus must be the accompanying 52 page booklet which not only notes background, usage and possible origins but suggests sources in print and even other recordings of interest.

Favourite tracks selection is unimportant. This is a well balanced collection, well recorded, well researched and a comprehensive starter-pack for visitors who I hope will flock to maritime weekends in the future.

COOPE BOYES AND SIMPSON "Falling Slowly"

NO MASTERS NMCD9

Since their first album was issued to wide acclaim three years ago, Coope Boyes and Simpson have been engaged in a succession of projects for radio, concerts and records, both at home and in Belgium. They have received increasing recognition and several awards along the way. At last they have made time to complete their own second album, and it is as striking and rewarding as their first.

One or two songs have already been tested in concert. Forward March, a verse set to music by Jim Boyes fits perfectly into their radical repertoire, Lester and Simpson's Standing in Line paints an unforgettable picture of the First World War. Most of the songs though, are new, either freshly written on recently adopted

like Rufford Park Poachers, a traditional song re-

cording a rebellion against gamekeepers and Ray Hearne's poignant Thurnscoe Rain, set to a familiar tune.

Jim's imagination leaps free in two visionary scenes. Spinning in the Sky dedicated to a marooned cosmonaut and Since the Exodus Began depicting a dying planet. He uses humour as an effective weapon in So Sincere. Lester presents two aspects of romance and gives another trenchant reminder of World War One in Shuffling Jack. We are made to wait for the final majestic track to hear a song led by Barry Coope. The Ship describes the start of a voyage towards an uncertain destination. But for Coope Boyes and Simpson, the success of the their latest venture is assured.

THE CLYDESIDERS "Crossing the Borders"

REL RECD502

This CD came with a rather smart, colour info sheet and an insert to tell me all about the band. This is great because I know nothing at all about them. The Clydesiders are a 5 piece outfit: Sandy Kelso: vocals, Duncan McCrone: guitar and vocals, Chris Stout: fiddle.keyboard and vocals, John Graham: quitar, mandolin and vocals and Duncan MacDonald: bass.

The band have been going since the 1970's but only two of the originals remain. The CD has 13 tracks, a mixture of traditional and contemporary material and runs for 53 minutes. On the whole. this is a very pleasant album to listen to. All the arrangements to the songs are tastefully done and they have avoided the pitfall of making it "over produced". There are songs from Chris While and Julie Matthews, Ewan Maccoll and Gallagher and Lyle.

The best tracks for me are "My Old Man" and "Land O' the Leal". The tunes are well produced and they have a lovely, mellow fiddle sound. My only criticism would be that there are one or two "iffy" notes on the vocals here and there.

On the strength of this, well worth going to see. Ken Howard

PENTANGLE "So Early in the Spring" PARK RECORDS PRK CD 35

Yes they're still around, 27 years on and still able to give me a tingle! I remember seeing the original line up back in the early 70's - probably at Cambridge Folk Festival (Which I managed to get to most years - pre kids!) They were refreshingly unique then and their style has matured like a good wine, without loosing any of the sparkle and effervescence of youth.

There's 44 minutes here - 9 tracks - originally recorded in Germany in 1989 for a European release, but thankfully available here now in the UK on Park Records.

Personnel here are Jacqui McShee (Voc). Bert Jansch (Voc & Guitar), Rod Clements (Guitar & Mand), Nigel Portman Smith (Bass) and the ubiquitous Gerry Conway on Drums. Flute and Whistle are added by guest musician Tony Roberts.

The pedigree of the above must ensure a superb performance and I wasn't to be disappointed. The first track "So Early in the Spring" sets the style and it never really looks back. Jacqui's vocals are superb as ever with Bert's rather "lived in" tones complementing nicely listen to that guitar though.

A lot of familiar tracks here. Reynardine, Bramble Briar (Bruton Town), The Blacksmith, but they all manage to sound as fresh as ever. I've played the album a lot and I like it - can't think of any minus points - beautifully recorded, nice sleeve and all the words to sing along with the old favourites. Oi'll give it

"Extravagant Schemes

Joe again has come up trumps with a real classic, containing more than 17 songs brought together from over a period of 30 years and as Joe says himself "tells my life story".

With Joe there is an extravaganza of accompanying musicians in Phil Beer, Jim Couza, Tony Gibbons, Bill Zorn, Dave Anderson, Paul Downs, Paul Taylor, Tony Hepworth, Neil Humber, Sue and Rod Leedale, Jeremy Taylor, Martin Whittell and a family of Steads -Phew!

With the CD comes a 20 page booklet with words of all the songs and why they were written, which as far as I'm concerned adds to the quality of listening and understanding.

The 1st track "A Sinister deadly Load" catalogues the transport of nuclear waste from Sellafield up the Calder Valley and sort of reminds you of the possible disasters should things go wrong.

The 5th track "Just another Folk Singer" is dedicated to Pete Seegar who Joe first saw back in 1959 and who later in 1995 he was privileged to play in concert with.

The 7th track "The Cragg Vale Coiners" tells of the return of local hero "King David Hartley" who returned to The West Riding of Yorkshire to resume the practice of coining/clipping and together with his brothers, The Prince and Duke of York, as they were christened, carried out the trade until fate brought them to the gallows.

Track 10 "Cape May" reminisces on the visits made to the southern part of New Jersey made over the years by Joe and his adventures into the pleasures of Upside Down Margaritas, a drink that becomes habit forming requiring counselling to drop the habit.

I could go on and on giving you a descriptive passage with every song but that would take the pleasure out of deciding for yourselves wouldn't

I must congratulate Joe on his deep convictions and on recording this quality CD with great energy and thought and aptly produced by Paul Downs and at £10 a real snip of a package.

Jim Boyes & Lester Simpson

COCK & BULL BAND "Pumped up and Loaded"

MCRCD 6992

I have been a fan of Cock and Bull since they were The Hemlock Cock and Bull Band all those years ago. Since then they have progressed from English style dance band to today's Anglo-French fusion of traditional folk, jazz, baroque and rock. This CD shows off their skills as a concert band rather than as a dance band, although all but three tracks are tunes. The three song tracks are traditional French songs arranged by the band. They call to mind the late, lamented Malicorne - how I imagine Malicorne would sound if they were still in existence. The

tune tracks are all written by the various band members. The style of music is really one on its own - just as it starts moving into a recognisable idiom, be it folk, jazz or baroque, in comes a different instrumentation to steer the sound into new realms. The combination of instruments must be unique: Jean-Pierre Rasle on crumhorn, recorders and various French and English bagpipes; Pete Lockwood on drums, percussion, keyboards, alto and soprano saxophones: Vanda Sainsbury on clarinet, piano, keyboards, alto and soprano saxophones; Paul Martin on mandola and Appalachian dulcimer. Pete's brother Dave Lockwood, a fine musician in his own

right, guests on electric guitar and bass. Jean-Pierre sings the

lead vocals which may well explain the Malicorne-like feel to the vocal tracks, Jean-Pierre having sung and played in the past with Gabriel Yacoub.

If you are already a fan of Cock and Bull you are going to be knocked out by this recording. If you haven't heard them before, buy this CD, prepare to be knocked out by the music, then persuade your local Folk Club/Arts Centre to book them. On the strength of this CD they should be getting plenty of bookings to appear in a concert setting. They already have a very strong following in the English ceilidh dance world - this should see them being taken seriously by the non-dancers in the folk world and beyond.

Pauline, since winning the Young Trad. Musician of the year a few years ago, has been forging a reputation as one of the leading exponents of the Northumbrian Pipes and listening to this, you can hear how well deserved it is.

For quite a while now, Pauline and Tom have been popping up together and it obviously works a treat, as this album is the result of the partnership.

Recorded in Yorkshire by Chris Newman (who plays guitar on most tracks), I'd like to congratulate him on getting the mix just right. These particular instruments have to be treated with respect in the recording studio - I know! Tom and Pauline have both laid down the odd track in my

studio in the past year and I'm glad to say that they're in good

hands with Chris Newman.

The CD runs nearly an hour with 11 tracks. Naturally there are a good few instrumentals and I won't attempt to list them as most are medleys of two or three tunes, each seamlessly run together. Some are trad., while Tom and Pauline both take composer credits, as well as Jay Ungar (USA) on one track.

I'm always surprised by Tom's voice when I hear it, as I always think of him as a fiddler. He turns in some beautiful performances here - particularly "Beeswing" and my particular favourite "Here's the Tender Coming".

A cracker of an album - love the "Tom-Cat" - clever eh? Rush out and buy it at once, 'scuse me while I put it on again - aaaah!

..........Welcome back; now you know what I'm talking about. My C.D. player is waving the white flag, I've played this so many times.

I don't know where to start it just seems the perfect CD. The music by John Tams (who also appears as Hagman in the series) and Dominic Muldawney brings alive the atmosphere and the thoughts and lives of the characters.

I've long been a big fan of John Tam's work since seeing "The Ship" and this has all the hallmarks of his best work. Apart from John himself the CD features Kate Rusby, John McCusker, Barry Coope, Roger Wilson, The Band of the Light Division and The Moscow Symphony Orchestra. The material is mainly traditional with original material by John Tams and Dominic Muldawney. It's hard to pick out highlights but both of Kate Rusby's tracks: "The Collier Recruit" and "Broken Hearted I will Wander" are a joy to listen to. John Tams "Spanish Bride" interlaced with "Spanish Ladies" is very clever and of course the theme "Over The Hills and Far Away" is brilliantly arranged and then there are the orchestral pieces...... 52 minutes of pleasure. Go out and get it, you're not borrowing mine.

POPELUC "Blue Dor"

In 1991 I found myself playing for a morris team in Drebecen, which is in Hungary, but very near the Romanian border. One of the outstanding memories of those few days is listening in the early hours of the morning to a group of Romanian musicians. They came from not very far across the border, but this was the first time for many years that they had been allowed to leave the country. Later in the same week we saw a group of gypsy musicians from Romanian Transylvania playing at a Dance House in Budapest. They had been "discovered" by the Hungarians, who were busy looking to the Hungarian speakers in Romania to rediscover their own musical traditions. When I first listened to this CD I was immediately transported back to these encounters with the traditional music of Romania.

Ioan Pop, a Romanian folk musician whose main instrument is zongora, a 5 string guitar tuned to an open chord, Pete Castle, wellknown on the folk club circuit and Lucy Castle, Pete's daughter. Lucy has been studying traditional Romanian fiddle playing in Romania. Although I had heard good reports of the trio following various local folk club appearances, this CD was the first opportunity I'd had to listen to them. They set out to blend the traditional music of Britain and Romania. The majority of the tracks are fairly straight Romanian tunes and songs. Pete Castle sings two classic English folk songs, Lemeny and Reynardine, and the rest are a fusion of English and Romanian styles.

Lucy Castle certainly shows herself to have mastered the complexities of playing the fiddle in a Romanian style, and to my ears it is the straight Romanian tracks that work best. I personally find that the English tracks do not sit well with the Romanian ones. At first I wasn't sure why, but after playing the CD a couple of times I realised. The Romanian music comes from a live, vibrant tradition, which is being juxtaposed against an "English Revival" style of singing. I have never been a great fan of the English folk club style of singing folk songs with guitar in hand (oh dear I've just upset most of the readership of this magazine). This CD shows up the differences between the living and the revival traditions very well. If the band really want to combine the two, then perhaps they should immerse themselves in the traditional singers and recordings of this country, in the same way that Lucy Castle has done with the music of Romania.

For all that, this is a very well produced CD which features some excellent music. Particularly interesting are the tracks recorded live at parties in Romania. I think I will be playing this CD quite a lot, but using the programme button to skip the English tracks.

JANA HELLER "Laughing in crime"




Jana Heller grew up in L.A. and toured with bands in California and now lives here. The press release says that she is targeting folk clubs and folk festivals with this release.

The second, the quieter songs make more of an impact. The lyrics seem to have more thought behind them and the arrangements prove that its what you leave out that often makes a song a winner. "Mirror", "Mad Waltzing" and "Innocent Ways" highlight this.

I'd really like to see Jana live to see what she has to offer Folk Clubs and Festivals. As an organiser I'm not sure I would book her just based on this CD.

MOORLAND FOLK "Counting the Bars

SHAMROCK MF01

There was a time when you could go into a pub or a folk club and hear songs that were singable and easily memorised, with no "A Level" choruses, just songs that you wanted to hear again. If you feel that you are missing those days then buy this CD.

Moorland Folk have been singing and playing in the Blackburn area for 20 years and still remain one of the best kept secrets since D-day. Here we have a trio who obviously enjoy their music but rarely perform in folk clubs, yet their material emanates from the very soul of our music.

Their first venture into a recording studio has resulted in this excellent 13 track offering with a selection of traditional and popular contemporary songs, "Peggy Gordon", "Donegal Danny" and Eric Bogle's "Green Fields of France" they are all here and all admirably performed.

The disc opens with the Furey's "Steamboat Row" a good pacey opener with Des Powell's bass pushing the songs along. Brian Osborne's "Old Pendle" is sung from the heart as you would expect from a group based at the bottom of Pendle Hill. "Run for Home" may be a little under-paced for some tastes but the words, which are after all the reason for the song, come through superbly.

The disc continues at a consistently high standard with Dave Higginsons fine voice fronting all the songs and some excellent guitar and banjo work from Dylan Owen - particularly on "Ride On". (I'm not too sure about the seagulls on "Fiddlers Green" since I got splattered at Whitby one year!).

I have enjoyed this offering from three honest hard-working performers. It is an album that is

perfect for singing along to in the car of for bringing back memories. It's well produced and Mike Waters art work on the cover is quite delightful and worthy of the fine disc.

CRAIG DUGGAN - "Songs of Cumbria"

LOOSE RECORDS LSECD 10

I must be truthful this is the first time I have heard of Craig Duggan but it certainly won't be the last. Craig has been around the folk/roots/country scene for some 20yrs and with the help of local musicians has put together a CD of Cumbrian Songs that help to give depth to its people, place and culture.

The CD contains 12 good standard songs with over half of them given over to Craig's own arrangements. Titles include "Recruited Collier", "Ellen Vannen", "Lish Young Buy-A-Broom", "Copshawholme Fair", "Wetheral Green" and "Bewcastle" a Prior/Kemp song.

The first track "Bewcastle" opens the CD and sets the atmosphere for the rest of the offerings.

The refreshing arrangements and obvious enjoyment during recording make for easy listening giving a new dimension to some of the standard songs.

To dwell on individual titles and say which is the best would be unfair to the CD as all are given the full professional treatment of Craig. Assisting with the music on the CD are Brian Armstrong (Guitar), Malcolm Mason (Percussion), Stewart Richardson (Bass Guitar), Roberts Haslam (English Concertina, Whistle), Sara Barnard (Violin) and Ian Kellet (Piano).

The recording is totally Cumbrian and was recorded at Lemon Grass Studios in Abbeytown with the release being due on November 30th.
