

SHOW OF HANDS

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FRED JORDAN - Gold Badge Award of the English Folk Dance And Song Society

Fred Jordan was presented with his Gold Badge of the English Folk Dance and Song Society at the National Folk Music Festival on April 14 1996 at the end of the Sunday afternoon concert. After the citation had been read by Derek Schofield, and the Gold Badge presented by National Council Chairman, Hilary Warburton, Fred's health was toasted in Champagne by fellow festival guests Norma Waterson, Tony Davis, Bob Davenport, The Rakes and others. Fred responded by singing three songs: "The Rose of Allendale", "The Farmers Boy" and "The Seeds of Love".

"The Gold Badge of the English Folk Dance and Song Society is awarded for distinguished and unique contributions to the folk performing arts and it is customary for a citation to be read out whenever the award is

The award today to Fred Jordan is no exception and I can think of no more suitable occasion than the National Folk Festival for this award to be made. especially as this year we have been looking back to the first festival at Keele in 1965. Fred attended that first festival, when he was 43 years of age and only illness has prevented him attending every one since.

Born in Ludlow. Shropshire in 1922. Fred Jordan's stage debut came at the age of six when he won one pound from singing "The Gypsy's Warning" at Ludlow Town Hall. In his twenties, he became well-known locally as a singer, learning his songs from three main sources: his parents, travellers and men that he worked with on farms in Shropshire.

In 1952 Fred was recorded by Peter Kennedy as part of the BBC Recording Scheme: at barely 30 years of age, Fred's singing came as a revelation because most of the men and women who were recorded at the time were over the age of 60.

Fred's youth and willingness to sing soon led to him being invited beyond Shropshire. He broadcast from Birmingham for the Midland Region of the BBC in the mid-fifties, and in 1958 and 1959 Fred was invited to the Folk Music Festival at Cecil Sharp House in London organised by the EFDSS, where he met up with other singers such as Pop Maynard and Harry Cox, as well as Reg Hall. By the early 1960's, Fred was travelling widely: The Fox Club in London, the Free Trade Hall and London's Royal Festival Hall. He was a natural choice for the first Keele Festival in 1965 and 1967 saw him at the Cambridge Festival, and in 1968 the Bromvard Festival.

In 1971 the EFDSS decided to re-enact the historic meeting between Cecil Sharp and John England when Sharp collected his first folk song, "The Seeds of Love" for the Royal Albert Hall Festival. Fred was asked to learn the song and "play the part" of John England. In rehearsal. Fred was asked to sing just three verses. 5 As Fred told them "If I can't sing all the song, I shan't

sing it at all. If they can give the dancers two hours they can give me two minutes. I had my own way in

Fred's songs were recorded in the fifties by Fred Hamer and by Mike Yates who made the Topic LP "Songs of a Shropshire Farmworker" in 1966, A second album followed in 1974 "When the Frost is on the Pumpkin", recorded by Tony Foxworthy, A cassette "In Course of Time", was released in the Vaughan Williams Memorial Library series in 1991.

Through the 80's and 90's, Fred has continued to be sought after by clubs and festivals, and he has appeared in Whitby, Sidmouth, Fylde, Redcar, Bromyard and at the National Festival. He continues to sing locally in Shropshire, and his singing has recently been heard on BBC Radios 2 and 3.

Fred's repertoire has grown over the years. His interest and enthusiasm for singing led naturally to his desire to learn more songs and complete fragments of songs he remembered being sung by his mother and others. He struck a bargain with song collector Fred Hamer: for every song Hamer recorded from Fred, Hamer had to teach Fred a new song.

Fred's style of singing is much admired and quite distinctive: the late Peter Bellamy described his singing as displaying "some of the most genuinely expressive and adventurous stylistic variations you are likely to hear. (But be warned: he uses a palette-knife not a coal-shovel.)" No less distinctive is his "performance style". His ability to tell a story through a song is second to none and he performs with a professionalism which puts many younger singers to shame. He doesn't talk between songs: "Folks don't want a lecture. You make an audience listen more if you don't do any talking". Fred told me. The audience is very important for Fred. "You've got to please the audience not yourself" Fred says.

Fred Jordan is one of England's finest singers of traditional songs and he is held in great affection amongst discerning folk song enthusiasts. He is also a very private and dignified man, and it is most appropriate that he should be honoured with the award of the Gold Badge of the English Folk Dance and Song Society. The honour is well deserved and, I might add, long overdue."

A Youthful Perspective

YOUTHQUAKE -WERNETH FOLK WEEKEND 5-6 JULY 1997

Youthquake was set up in 1991 to run workshops for teenagers but over time we've diversified into several areas. In 1993 we planned a programme for Maghull's Day of Music, in 1994 we took over the organisation of the annual Carrying It on Concert in Melling and developed a Youthquake programme for Redcar Festival. In 1995 Jenny Shotliff together with Tim Van Eyken developed the Shooting Roots programme of youth events at Sidmouth - all of these events are being continually developed alongside workshop and concert programmes at other festivals including Fylde, Bromyard, Middlewich, Bedworth, Lowton and more.

A new development came in 1996 when In With a Chance asked Youthquake to take on the organisation of the Werneth Folk Weekend in conjunction with Oldham Leisure Services. InWaC had always been keen to encourage young folkies in their work promoting traditional NW music and felt it would be interesting and fitting to see how Youthquake would develop the

We found our feet last year and are looking forward to a great weekend now we know what to expect! We want the event to be both attractive and affordable for families and young people. The Saturday costs £7 for adults, £5 for U18's and concessions and £15 for families while the Sunday is free. It is also an important concern to us that we encourage both young performers and tutors.

Saturday features a series of workshops, a youthquake showcase and childrens events. There's song workshops with Vanessa Rudden, a lovely singer from Manchester, and Steve Higham and Tony Gibbons from Garva, Tanya Manci from Dartmoor, a box player whose early influences included Bob Cann's Pixie Band will be helping out with the Youthquake workshop and running a Dartmoor step workshop. Four members of the young Northern Irish band Deanta, about to release their third album on Green Linnet, will be joining us for the weekend and are going to run an Irish group workshop, DADGAD guitar and fiddle workshops as well as hosting a jam session after the evening ceilidh. Original hosts In With a Chance will be running a NW tune workshop and Jamie Knowles will be discussing his work collecting these tunes. Manchesters Vin Short will be running a bodhran workshop, Mike Rust will be telling stories, Sara Marshall (an NNEB) will be running Apalacian step workshops especially suitable for 7 - 12 year olds and there will be more workshops with Garva. Terry Coyne is hosting a flute/whistle workshop, John Murphy a tenor banjo

workshop and the band will be talking about PA, presentation, performance and more before running the evening ceilidh.

The free Sunday open air concert features Waterson-:Carthy, Garva and from Deanta, Kate O'Brien. Eoghan O'Brien, Clodagh Warnock and Deirdre Havlin. Flipjacks will also be there running the juggling

LIVE REVIEWS (Continued): Carrying It On 7

Melling Tithebarn, 22nd February, 1997

In previous years this concert has featured performers clearly bound for glory. This year there's no doubt in my mind that any of the acts could turn into major professional attractions if they had a mind to. The quality of the acts is a tribute to the talent-spotting capabilities of multi-skilled maestro Jenny Shotliff.

The evening opened with a trio, Chris and Hannah Coutts - familiar faces at Youthquake gatherings - plus Oliver Little, on guitars / fiddles / mandolin giving generous amounts of melodious welly to a Levellers and Show Of Hands pair of songs.

Damon Holland is another regular quakeperson, teamed this time with mate Tom and billed as the Southport Likely Lads. On guitar/ mandolin/ flute they produced a nicely balanced set of trad/ contemporary/ self-penned numbers, delivered with pace and panache.

Up from Sheffield came Highly Corrosive, seen by Jenny at Fylde and promptly booked. Three lasses on fiddles plus one lad on quitar, they looked an intriguing lineup before a note was played. Then when they began their music held the packed audience's attention in a vice-like grip. Tunes from Ireland and around Europe tumbled out in finely layered arrangements, simple and unfussy but dramatic and mesmerising, reminiscent of the brilliant French string band Archetype.

Uillean piper Liam Murphy was one of the early YQ faithful, supporting the fledgling outfit during its first attempts to promote and assist folk performance amongst the chronologically under-endowed. Amazingly this was his first public stage performance and if he lacked any confidence it certainly didn't show in his playing, solid throughout and with a brisk lightness on the dance tunes mirrored by a deep resonance on the slow airs. Masterful stuff and a clear warning that his dad better watch out otherwise Garva may decide to trade in their old piper for the latest model.

Siulann take pride in the Gaelic roots of their music and songs while bringing in influences from rock, soul, country and jazz. Comprising of a certain Ms Shotliff, impressive young multi-instrumentalist Gareth Banks and once-young anchorman Eoin O'Bruachain, the group have a strength and vitality that spans the years merging freshness with experience. Their songs and tunes from diverse sources offered thoughtfulness and excitement by turns and brought the first half to a resounding conclusion.

The Quartet With No Name were in fact Ben Wood, his cousin Alan, Damon H. and Lucinda McIlveen. Fine musicianship (guitar, bass, flute and mandolin) and strong singing, bristling with enthusiasm especially on their enigmatic opening number Echoes of the Shavian, composed by Ben.

Jenny then stepped forward to play a few unscheduled tunes to accompany some fancy Appalachian footwork from Sam Pirt. All change as Sam strapped on an accordion and Jenny was replaced by guitarist David Wood, who only a few short column inches ago had supplied the driving rhythm and frantic fretting in Highly Corrosive. They played a set of mainly Celtic tunes - Sam displaying a Cunninghamesque swing - switching gear from slow and sultry to fast and furious with total ease. The sheer joy in their performance was irresist-

ibly infectious.

But if music be the food of whatsit then singing has to be the thirst-quenching and invigorating drink that goes with it. Rhiannon Banks treated us to a heady brew of passion and sensitivity, her rendition of Lakes of Ponchartrain as fine as you're likely to hear. Siulann provided nicely arranged backing that counterpointed and decorated her singing without becoming intrusive.

And so we came to the headline act, Chris Sherburn and Denny Bartley (see photo, left). Seldom have humble

concertina and guitar combined to such incandescent effect - those chaps can't half knock out a tune and the superb supplement of Chris's sister Jane on bodhran was an added bonus. Catch them if you can at festivals and concerts all over the country this summer. Throughout their set Chris and Denny oozed a cheeky charm that dared you to dislike them if you could. If that wasn't enough to win them the Good Blokes of the Week Award, Chris had spent all evening perched at the back of the stage at the mixing desk twiddling knobs while Denny kept him advised from front of house. What heroes! The final massed jam session was the usual marvellous mayhem, rounding off a terrific showcase of promising talent.

The only thing missing was the familiar smiling face of Dave Day. His personal crusade on behalf of young people's participation in folk performance had created and nurtured this event through the years and the quality of the evening's musicianship and entertainment stood as a powerful testament to Dave's endur

ENGLISH FOLK SONG - AN INTRODUCTORY BIBLIOGRAPHY

DAVID ATKINSON

This booklet is published by E.F.D.S.S. on behalf of the Vaughan Williams Memorial Library. It is, as the title says, a bibliography for students and enthusiasts of English folk song. It can also act as a guide to the many collections of folk songs which exist.

In the latter respect the guide is usefully divided into sections which are:

"Song & Ballad Collections", which is further subdivided into General and then by region; "Broadsides and Early Manuscripts"; "Occupational Songs" - further sub-divided into the occupations e.g. "Miners Songs"; "Travellers Songs"; "Carols"; "Songs of Customs"; "Children's Songs" etc.

There are also brief references to revivals, collecting, song research, etc. It is a very useful starting point for researchers, collectors & singers looking for particular aspects of folk song, whether from an academic viewpoint or a singer looking for song sources.

The North West section on the song collections has five entries including Harry and Lesley Boardman's legendary "Folk Songs and Ballads of Lancashire" and Mike Harding's popular collection "Folk Songs of Lancashire". The books & collections listed are held in the Vaughan Williams Memorial Library and can be accessed through Malcolm Taylor the librarian.

No price is indicated on my review copy but I don't think the cost of this little gem will break anyone's bank balance. For more details, contact the V.W.M. library at Cecil Sharp House on 0171 284 0523

It was typical of the man to insist that there should be no mourning - he just wanted a good send-off. And he got one!

ARTISAN - "OUR BACK YARD"

BOING 9604CD

"Our back yard is a personal look at life from the 1950's right up to the present day; a gallop through fifty vears of recent history and memories."

So begin the sleeve notes for this latest CD from arguably Yorkshire's top a cappella group and although it is a "personal look" the songs on this album will strike a chord with each and every listener. The opening track "Do you remember?" is a fond look back at the things of yesteryear - Co-op divi, carpet beaters, milkman's horse, they're all there - I even detect a passing snatch of our beloved Rawtenstall Annual Fair in the chorus!

This album is not a one-level offering, it is full of sensitive songs, of humorous songs, of songs of hope and songs of despair. Each track is worth listening to, each verse is one to savour. No-one performs Artisan songs better than Artisan themselves and Brian Bedford's production on this CD is quite splendid.

It is pretty normal on Artisan discs that each song will have been written by Brian, but not this time. "The Spiral Trap" is a song written by Ian Tuppling of LocTup Together, who lives on our side of the Pennines. Well done lan! - and well done Artisan for grabbing a good song!

I've enjoyed listening to Our Back Yard, it's an album worthy of a place in anyone's record collection. But there is one track above all the rest that should be compulsory for politicians of every party. "A Posy Made of Dreams" highlights what is wrong with our education system, why the standards are falling and why teachers are disillusioned. Is there a chance that after the Election things might change for the better?

BOB FOX & BENNY GRAHAM - "HOW ARE YOU OFF FOR COALS?"

This CD is a result of a show of the same name which has been put on at a number of festivals and a development of the cassette that originally went with it (there are more songs on the CD). It is surely one of the best things to come out the North-east for a long time (sorry Jez & Vin fans!) containing, as it does some of the finest mining songs written.

It obviously has a north eastern bias but there is a useful glossary in the sleeve notes for non-natives! Tommy Armstrong (the pit man's poet) songs are Purdon's "Blackleg Mining Man" included. Three of 18 Buy this CD and give yourself a treat - it's brilliant.

Johnny Handle's works are represented as is one of Benny's own songs, "Have a Game for the Crack".

As to the performers, I'm sure that most folk are aware of Bob Fox's superb singing and fine guitar work as well as Benny Graham's strong clear tones backed by his nifty melodeon playing. Fortunately, these two great talents "gel" very well as a duo.

The only thing missing is Benny's wonderful "chat" - if ever a man could talk the hind legs off a pit pony he could! - but you'll have to see the show for that. In the meantime I suggest you buy this album and learn the choruses in readiness. Wonderful stuff! - particularly the photograph of "Smiler" on the cover!

DAVE WEBBER & ANNI FENTIMAN -"BONNET AND SHAWL"

DRAGON RECORDS DRGNCD961

When I was offered this album for review I wondered whether this talented pair could repeat the quality of their previous CD Together Solo. Well they haven't they've topped it by some considerable margin.

Dave in addition to a rich voice shares, with the late Keith Marsden, an ability to write songs that belong to an age long-passed. The title track is one of these, a song that takes you into the life of a west country village, a song of mature love, a truly beautiful song that it's almost impossible to believe it was written round about 1980 and not 1780.

Anni isn't a songwriter (at least not on this offering) but her voice, like Dave's songs, has a timeless quality as well as a wonderful clarity which she uses to superb effect on her native Tyneside songs. Just listen to her sing Gallowgate Lad and the Geordie accent will no longer be a closed book to you who have had a more refined upbringing in King Cotton country.

Track 3 is Tim Laycock's setting of Row On and here some of Dave and Anni's friends get in on the act. Sensitive fiddling from Tom McConville and a bassvoice line from Johnny Collins that gets other "singers of low songs" sticking pins into clay effigies of a certain long bearded singer. The rest of this album is shear bliss, this is a collection of songs that keeps going back on to the CD player.

Kipling's Follow me 'Ome and Rio are included, both fitted with tunes by the late Peter Bellamy - whose concertina Dave now plays. The tradition is well served with seven of the tracks. Waterloo is not to be missed: a real "belter" of a song where Pete and Trish Watkinson and Johnny are really given their heads.
