

From Ushant to Scilly is thirty-five leagues.



CLUB OF THE MONTH:

Wellgreen

Although the Wellgreen has tried to maintain a keen interest in the development of the N.W.F.F.C. its representatives have been either too broke or too drunk to attend any of its meetings, and thus we were pleasantly surprised when the Editor gave us this opportunity to tell everyone what a good Club we have.



We consider the Wellgreen Folk Club, started by Pete Wilmot in 1962, to be one of the oldest in the North West. At that time a regular singer at Manchester Sports Guild, Pete met the Wood family and soon the idea of his own Club came to fruition. The ball started rolling at Moorside Tennis Club in Flixton, but soon outgrew the toilet facilities there, and so the Club moved to the Wellgreen Hotel in Hale, near Altrincham. Three years later the Wood Family started their own Club in Bollington, and the Dog Hobble Ramblers joined Pete as residents. At about this time, trouble with the Manager prompted a move to the Red Robin Club at Altrincham Football Club, and later the Ramblers split up, giving birth to the popular Tom and Smiley Duo - Pete was then joined by Tony and Arthur. This was in 1967 and as Pete says, the next seven years were to prove the great years of the Folk Boom". Before returning to its home at the Wellgreen in 1971 the Club had short spells at the Old Hall Hotel and Kersal Rugby Club. Tony and Arthur left Pete in 1973, giving the Cheshire Folk (who pride themselves on keeping going for nine years with only one change in personnel) the opportunity to become co-residents.

Also helping to run the Club are John Beattie and Larry Armstrong, who provide an excellent P.A. system (Soundsout), much praised by our guests, and also act as bouncers - in. Thus the Club is run, or staggered, by eight of us, but Pete Wilmot's record of seventeen years as a resident must take some beating - and he still con-

tinues to sing without the aid of a hairpiece.

The Club meets every Thursday at 8.30 and stays open all year. We cater for all tastes in folk music - from whacky entertainment (The Hooters have probably been our most popular guests) to serious traditional music; and we hope we can continue to persuade our audience that the music is as entertaining as the humour. The Club has always enjoyed floor singers of quality - from Rosemary Hardman in the early days to the present Club Idiot, Geoff Higginbottom. To qualify as Club Idiot, the victim has to come to the Club more often than anyone else. We try and encourage local groups and singers to earn their bookings alongside the better known national names. Regulars at the Wellgreen are never short of variety, and we also keep curselves up to date with our own hi-monthly newsletter.

We are confident for the future; despite our position - ensconced in a Whitbread house in a suburban area! The biggest question mark must be over economics - for although it is amusing to look back on the days when the Club paid Barbara Dixon and Mike Harding £4.00 a night, the closure of the Davenport and Winder agency, following, as they claim, insufficient door prices, highlights the problems facing many Club organisers, who have responsibility to both audiences and folk musicians in general. With the right balance we look forward to another successful decade.

AGENUA by the Chairman

Two items have cropped up since the last issue the first of which concerns a member clubt

On 26th January 1979 a folk group called "Threadbare" were booked at the Coronation Folk Club in Southport. They failed to arrive. When the club organiser contacted their agents, Plant Life of Hitchen, they informed him that a letter of apology had been sent. It was not received. Accepting that it was probably a genuine mistake through nobody's fault in particular the Coronation re-booked the group, through Plant Life, to appear on 23rd November 1979. The fee, incidentally, I understand was £50. They again failed to turn up. No apologies had been received up to the time the club informed the Federation at the last committee meeting. A member club embarrassed and an audience let down -twice! They will not be booked again.

More fool you Coronation Folk Club for re-booking them you might think; but let me relate a similar incident at my own folk club the Dioconson Arms. I had booked Johnny Handle on the 19th October, 1979. He never arrived. The following day he telephoned me to say that he'd mixed up the dates between the contract and his diary, was extremely sorry and offered to come down to the club the following Friday (fortunately, a Singer's night) for half the original fee. This he did and needless to say gave no less a performance than he would have done the previous week for the full fee. The audience were happy and the club satisfied. He will definitely be booked again, anytime.

It does, therefore, happen to nearly every club eventually that an artiste(s) doesn't appear on the night but suffice to say I'll let you draw your own conclusions as to which artists(s) in my opinion I think behaved professionally and those which

did not. Beware, club organisers!

The second item concerns the future of the Federation. During my year of office some clubs have closed and some left the Federation whilst others have joined. The membership list now stands at 24 clubs. It is my fervent hope that from those 24 cluba at least half will be represented at the A.G.M. in February, because from those attending we will need three executive officers to replace the following: Membership Secretary - you may remember that Ian Strickland resigned last year due to other commitments. Treasurer - Vince Ludden was finally persuaded to give up the job until his health is back to normal. Chairman (stop cheering!) - because I have taken on a professional commitment that uses up the little spare time I have Teft.

If the A.G.M. is as badly attended as last year's at Preston the Federation (and hence the Newsletter - Ed.) may cease to exist simply because it is too much to expect the remaining Executive to carry on with all the jobs (at one point during last year I was carrying out three executive jobs!) I hope that doesn't happen because, whatever its faults, the Federation does serve the clubs but can't unless someone is at the helm. Let's face it where else in the world can a folk club get a year's publicity for £3 for a start?

I shall still continue to support the Federation through my own club The Dicconson Arms - I hope you will too. Many thanks to my hard-working executives

and all the best for the future.

REVIEW: JIAM '79

There was no sun at Ilam this year but there was plenty of good music and good cheer. This must be one of the prettiest festival sites in the country, a tree shaded meadow by the mysterious river Manifold surrounded by the glorious hills of the southern Peak District. The official title is Ilam Festival of Folk Music, Arts and Crafts and the craft tent was a marvellous place, full of working craftsfolk and splendid work. Musical instruments, carved heads, jewellery, textiles galore, puppets - the list is endless.

Even at a small festival like this you would need to be in three places at once to hear everyone. The lunch time concert got off to a fine start with Sommerville Gentlemens Band, a quartet who are all multi-instrumentalists. They did an excellent group of songs and tunes, with well-chosen accompaniments and some good unaccompanied part singing. The MC for the day, Graham Cooper, did a good set of songs from his extensive and varied repertoire. Next on was Gorden Tyrell who must have been disappointed not to impose his personality on a restless and changing audience. Then Gary and Vera took over, literally moved the audience and shook them into enjoying themselves. I defy anyone not to enjoy Vera's superb singing, playing and song writing - anyway Gary wouldn't let you. A thirty five minute spot flashed past, giving only a taste of their enthusiasm, their missionary fervour for Lanky and all things good and northern.

For dance enthusiasts there were afternoon and evening ceilidhs with Ramsbottom and Flash Packet while the singers tent ran all day with the Black Countrymen, Galadriel and Rattlin' Willy. The arena was filled with Morris teams (Blackcap, Greenwood, Stafford and Derby Crown Ladies), Owd 'Oss Mummers, Handsworth Sword


Dancers and a local Scottish Dance Group.

The main music event was the evening concert. It was opened by Six Hands in Tempo, a trio of singer/guitar players who performed what they admitted isn't folk music - but performed it very well. The packed audience hushed for Cyril Tawney. What is there left to say about a man who can be introduced as "a legend in his own lifetime" and live up to it? Apart from anything else, his self-accompaniment is a superb demonstration of how to do it. It ranges from the deceptively simple knocking rhythm for "Chicken on a Raft" to the subtle series of complex strums that give the continuous but ever varying support for "Sally Free and Easy". To me, his set was the highspot of the festival but for those with different tastes there was still the deservedly famous Ossian, the equally notorious Bernard Wrigley and top of the bill, Five Hand Reel.

One of the craft stands had a device for making your own badge. As I moved from the evening concert to the ceilidh via the CAMRA beer festival tent to discover an informal singaround in progress, the right slogan came to me. This sums up my

enjoyment: "Folk Music Lives!"

Congratulations to organiser David Brindley and long may Ilam continue as one of the major small festivals.



FEDERATION TOURS DEPT.

Federation Tours Department? What's that? - a booking office for mini-weekends on the Starship Enterprise? - a North-Eastern brewer's holiday club? Or a press-gang crew to force unsuspecting folk clubs to book unpopular singers. One thing's certain - it's not a very popular side of the Federation's affairs despite being our first aim (see inside front cover). In the twelve months I've done the job, I've arranged one "tour" - two bookings for Nick Dow! Maybe that's a poor reflection on me. But maybe, just maybe, it reflects rather on the state of the folk scene in general.

Let me ask you, the members of the folk clubs, a couple of questions:

1. Do you see the minutes of the Federation Committee?

2. Do you see the lists or letters I send to your club?

If you don't, why not? If you do, have you ever made your views known to your club organisers? Do you ever tell them who you want to see perform at your club?

More to the point, do you ever tell the organisers whether or not you enjoyed a particular performance? Folk is by folk for folk, so speak up!

What's all this got to do with Tours? Simply that I can't "block book" artistes if I can't get a few clubs to agree on who they want, and they can't decide who they want if you don't tell them who YOU want. I'm not trying to do the organisers out of jobs (though I know a few who wouldn't mind a helping hand or ten!), but rather I'm hoping that if a few more voices are added to the club scene, we might begin to solve some problems.

And there are some obvious problems with the Tours Department - of which more next issue. Meanwhile, get out and about the clubs to broaden your interests (see back cover).
